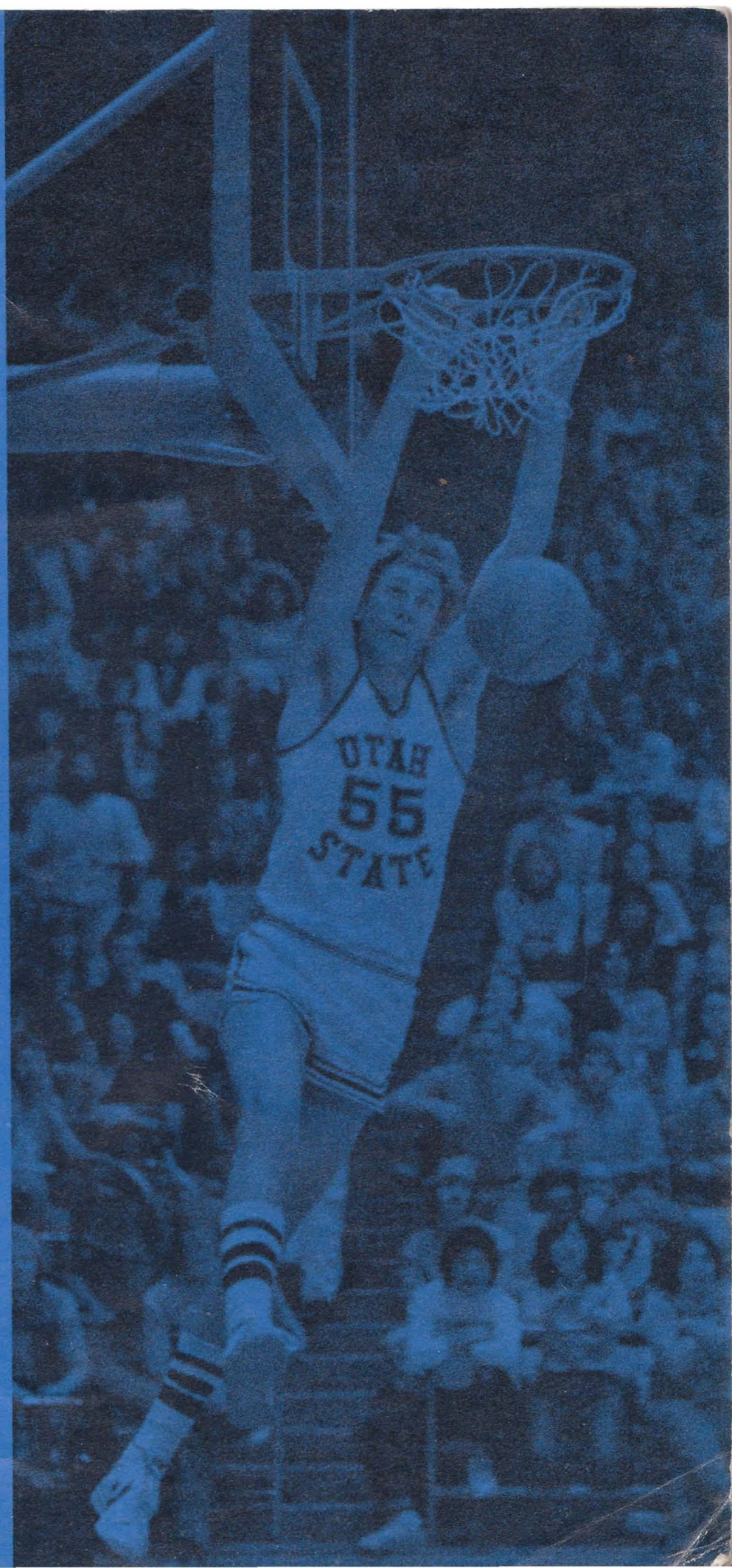

Third Straight Bid is Aggie Goal

For all the success Utah State basketball has enjoyed the past two decades, only once have the Aggies earned themselves three straight post-season trips.

This year, the chance is there again...a brutal early-season schedule and tough league race notwithstanding.

The Ags appeared in the NCAA first round playoffs last March in Pauley Pavilion in Los Angeles and the year before that played in the National Invitational Tournament.

With the retirement in March of six-year head coach Dutch Belnap, former assistant Rod Tueller has taken over the Aggie basketball program.

To pull off any post-season heroics his first year on the job, Tueller will have to overcome a personnel problem (an injury to the club's projected postman) and a December schedule which may amount to the roughest first-month slate any Aggie club has ever undertaken.

The November-December segment of the Aggie schedule—against eight different opponents—includes clubs which averaged 19 wins each a year ago. None of them had a losing season.

"I honestly view it as one of the toughest schedules Utah State has faced in years and years," said Tueller. "We start here November 30 against a Weber State team which should rate right up there with BYU. And right through the time for league play in January, I don't see a letup. From top to bottom, including a good PCAA race, I think it is as difficult a schedule as we've ever had here."

Although three starters are gone—guards Rawlee Perkins and Keith McDonald and forward-center Preston Bailess—Tueller and assistants Dana Pagett and Tom Stewart don't enter the season unarmed.

For starters there is one of the best pair of forwards in the country today: 6-8 senior Dean Hunger and 6-8 junior Brian Jackson.

Were Tueller able to use that pair appropriately—as legitimate forwards—he might feel more comfortable. But a severed tendon in the wrist (suffered by projected starting-center Leo Cunningham) has muddled the plans somewhat. Cunningham may yet play, but his degree of effectiveness is not known.

Hunger, 89 points short of 1,000 career points prior to the season, was a first team all-PCAA choice last year and he was also named to PCAA all-tournament team. A 56% career shooter, he stands a good chance of surpassing Troy Collier's school record (53.2%) in that category.

Jackson, with his 15.8 points a game average, is actually the team's top returning scorer. And, his 8.3 rebounds a game average was the team leading figure last year.

In order for the 1979-80 Aggies to come close to the 21-7 and 19-11 years the past two seasons, Jackson and Hunger must continue to improve; late-season flash Keith Hood will have to do the same things as a starter this year at guard he did in reserve last year; letterman Rich McElrath and the other guards must take over for graduated ballhandler Rawlee Perkins and somebody has got to prove they can handle the center position.

Cunningham seemed to be the most logical answer in the middle until his injury. If he is unable to help the Ags, Tueller will look for three-man combinations along the baseline, putting athletes the likes of Mark Miller, Craig Taylor, Haakon Austefjord or JC transfer Edgar Wickliffe in the lineup with the Jackson-Hunger tandem.

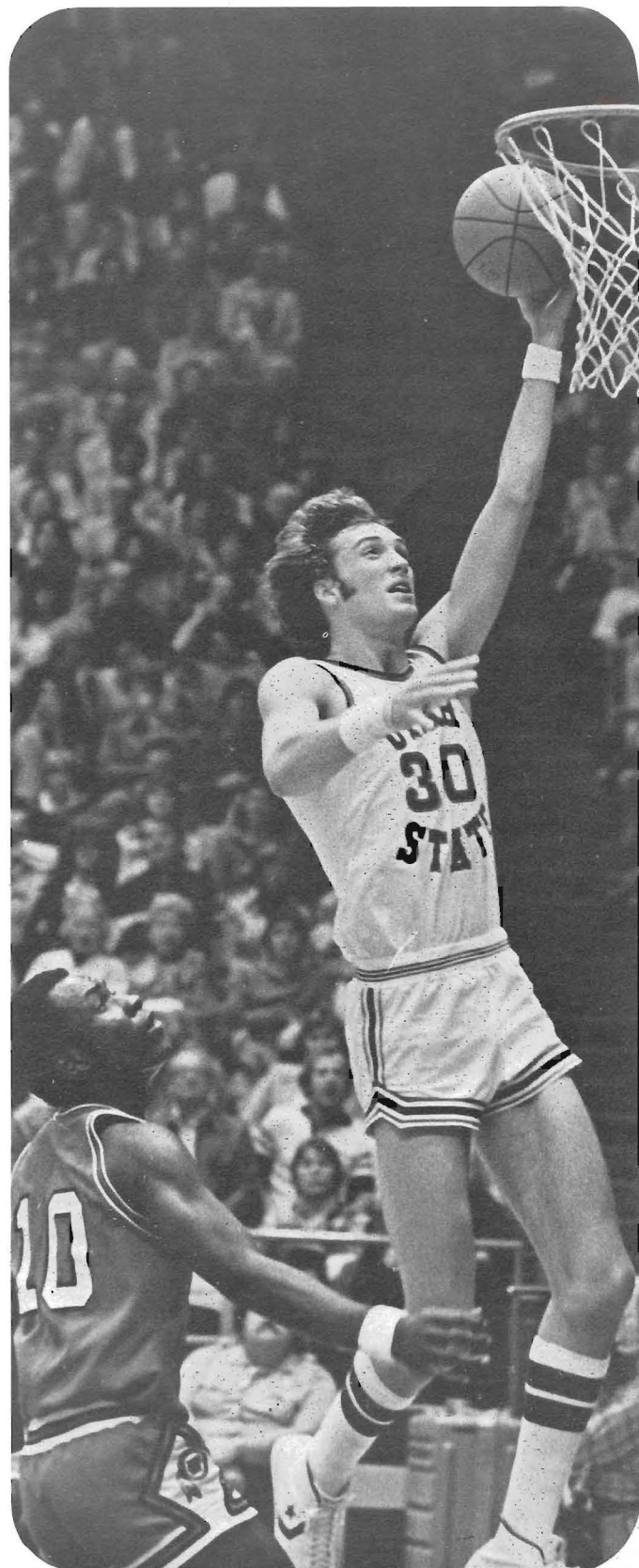
Taylor, Miller and Austefjord all played last year in reserve.

The experience McElrath, Hood and senior Steve Pinegar bring into the new season combined with new guards Larry Bergeson, a JC transfer, and freshman Lance Washington should leave Tueller at least as well stocked in the backcourt as retired coach Dutch Belnap was a year ago.

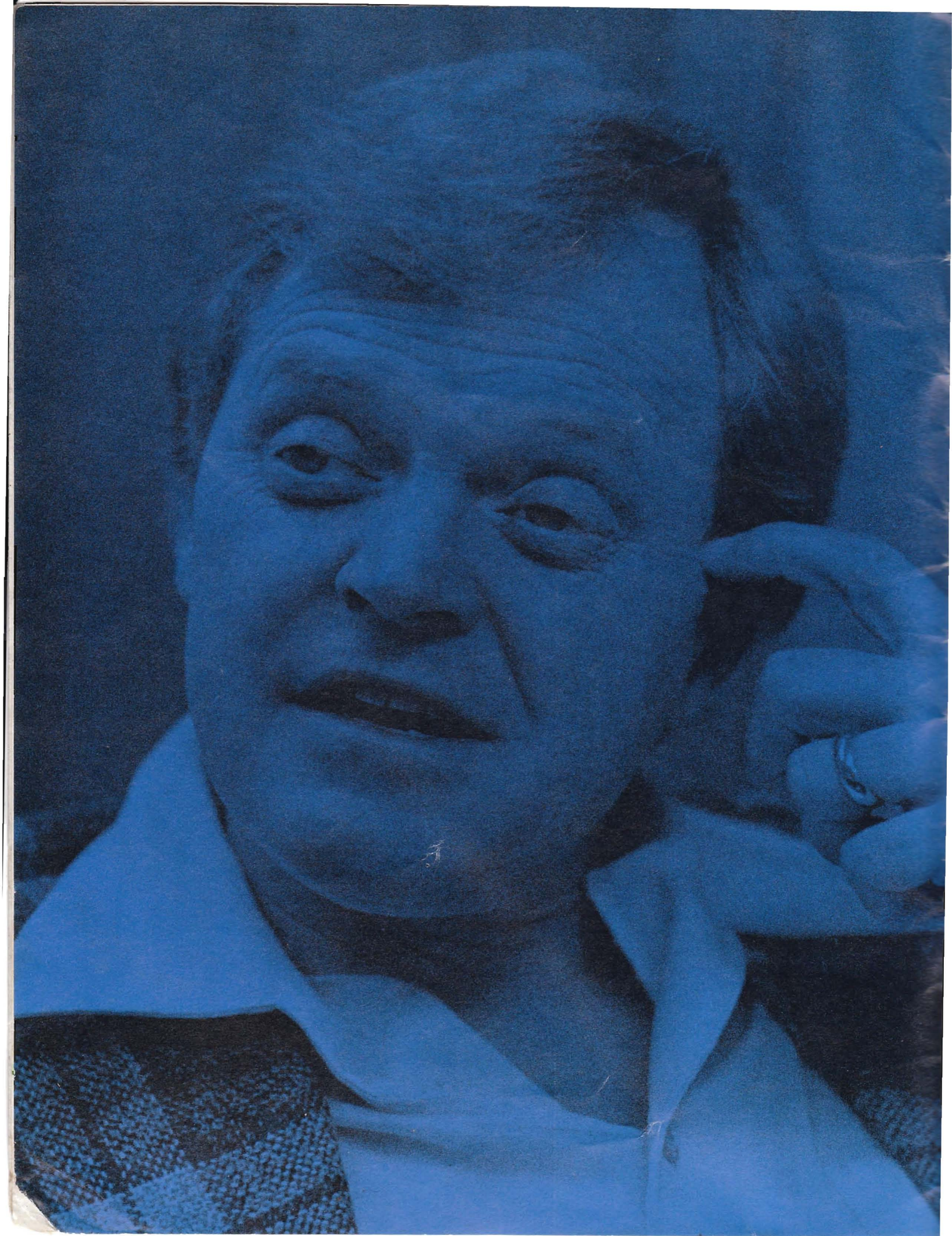
"We found out during our early-season drills just about any two of our guards work well together," said Tueller. "I really don't hesitate using any of several combinations there and that will give us some flexibility."

Nearing the school's second year in the PCAA (the Ags were second last year, 9-5 in league play) most 1979-80 pre-season guesses put the Ags somewhere in the middle of the conference.

"I don't think it is accurate to say we're in a rebuilding year, with Jackson and Hunger and Hood and McElrath as our nucleus," said Tueller. "But we're not really the veteran-type club you'd like to have. We can become a good, solid, contending team with help from Hood, McElrath, Wickliffe and a healthy Cunningham. The schedule is one of the toughest I can remember here, and that will force us to be strong...in a hurry."

New Head Coach Rod Tueller

Last March, soon after Utah State's ninth post-season basketball appearance in 18 years, 41-year old Aggie graduate Rod Tueller was vested with the challenge to continue the strong Aggie tradition in the sport.

A 1959 Utah State grad, Tueller is the school's 12th head basketball coach. He succeeds the man he assisted for six years: Dutch Belnap.

He was the popular choice for the job, following a nationwide search for Belnap's successor.

A longtime Cache Valley native, Tueller assumed his new job exactly 20 years after receiving his degree from Utah State. In between were 14 years of high school coaching (at Utah's Altamont and Logan High Schools) and six years on Belnap's staff at USU. During the span he spent with Belnap, the Ags fashioned a fine 106-58 record and appeared three times in post-season play.

The ascension to a head job on the collegiate level resulted from circumstances in stark contrast to a couple of decades earlier when he packed his young family off to eastern Utah and tiny Altamont High...and a situation he knew little about.

Tueller, father of six, knows what he's getting into this time. And he likes the challenge.

"I'm probably as blue and white as anybody you'll find," said Tueller. "I have some great ties with this university. I think I've been involved with this school in about every conceivable way: as a student, as a fan, as a father (three of his daughters attended USU and were members of the Aggiettes marching group) and as an employee. I'm really anxious to continue the great tradition we have here in basketball."

One of the brilliant young coaches to climb the ranks of Utah's prep game, he spent eight years (1965-1973) as the head coach at Logan High and



continually had the Grizzlies in the state tournament. (He spent two years as an assistant coach at Logan, after four years as the head man at Altamont).

Tueller's records on the high school level and during the past at Utah State when he directed the Jayvee program, indicate success (in terms of wins and losses.)

"But to me the real success in athletics is the association you have with players, coaches and administrators. And I attribute my success to being associated with good people."

What does the new coach have in mind for Aggie basketball?

"I'm not heavily oriented toward long-range goal planning," he said. "Honestly, my long-range goals are greater than any lifetime accomplishments."

"I guess you would say I love to get involved totally in whatever I'm into at the time. I really believe if you take care of the present, the future will be shaped in large measure by how deeply you dedicate yourself right now."

Tueller describes the style the program will assume as "...wide open; fast breaking offense and pressuring defense. But, that

doesn't mean I won't do other things to win. The key is adjusting the system to the players, and that will be our over-riding philosophy.

"Certainly, everything we're doing now is with the objective of maintaining USU's great tradition. And while that is the basis of the program now, a prime motivation is to improve it. To win the PCAA, to become successful in post-season play, and so on. But let's be honest, the success Dutch created will be a hard act to follow."

As a former prep coach, Tueller says one of the joys of collegiate basketball is working with the best of the high school athletes.

"I would call them physical geniuses," he said. "It's a challenge to get them to exercise their potential and to play to their capabilities."

And that is one of the tasks charged to Tueller and assistants Dana Pagett and Tom Stewart.

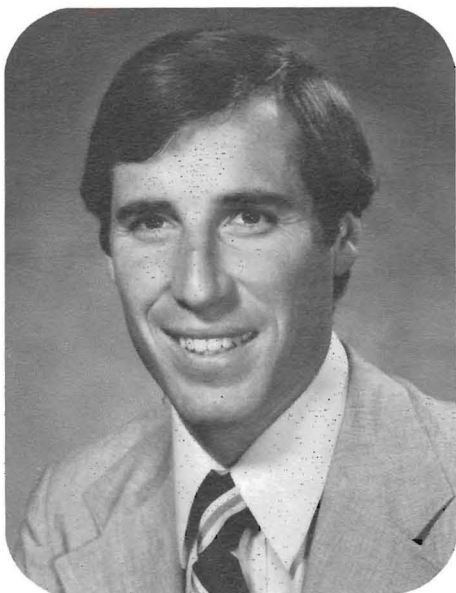
And then there is recruiting, the key to success everywhere in collegiate athletics.

"There is really nothing more to recruiting than selling," he said, "and any salesman will tell you the easiest product to sell is one you believe in. I don't find it too difficult to sell people on Cache Valley and Logan, and Utah State University."

Tueller's exposure to basketball led to a brilliant all-state high school athletic career at Logan High and then he spent a year and a half at the University of Utah playing for the legendary Jack Gardner before transferring to Utah State.

A Cedar City native, Rod is active in his church having served as a Bishop and now a member of his Stake High Council. He is married to the former Valene Danford. They are parents of six children: Tina (23), Dana (21), Lisa (19), Tann (18), Joni (17) and Juli (15).

Rod Tueller's senior lieutenant, Dana Pagett, is no stranger to Aggie basketball fans.

Pagett, 30, is in his third year on the Utah State coaching staff. He had been an assistant—as was Rod Tueller—to Dutch Belnap.

Once a backcourt performer at the University of Southern California, Dana is in charge of coordinating Utah State's basketball recruiting effort. In addition, he handles some responsibilities in scouting as well as on-floor coaching.

Dana joined the Aggie staff prior to the 1977-78 season after three years as an assistant coach to Dwight Jones at Long Beach State. Dana's knowledge of the PCAA was invaluable to the Aggies last year in USU's first season in the conference.

While at Long Beach State, Dana helped the 49ers to three conference titles. Long Beach State was 54-27 during that time.

During his two years with the Aggies, Utah State clubs have won 40 games and lost 18.

Dana started his coaching career under the legendary Bob Boyd at USC when he served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater during the 1972-73 season.

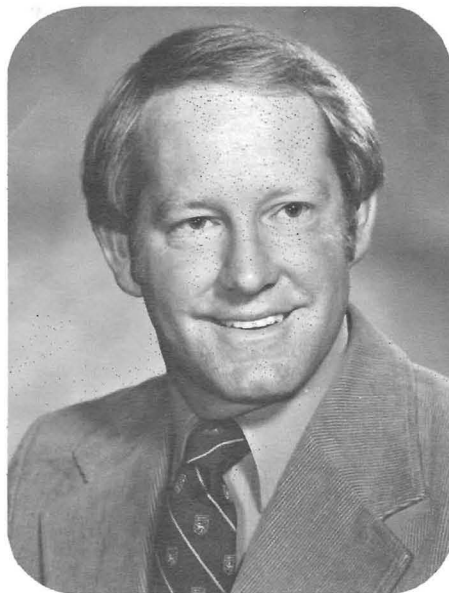
Before joining the Long Beach State program, he was an assistant for a year (1973-74) at Loyola of Los Angeles under Dave Benedaret.

A winner at every level of competition, he was a guard on three USC teams (1968-71) which combined to win 47 of 68 games.

As a prep, he was a high school all-America at El Segundo High.

Dana is married to the former Sue Birdsall of El Segundo and they are parents of two sons, Brett and Kyle.

Tom Stewart



Tom Stewart, junior college transfer who joined Ladell Andersen's Aggie basketball program 14 years ago, returned in July to become an assistant to new Utah State Head Coach Rod Tueller.

Stewart, a three-year letterman at USU from 1965 through 1968, had been in coaching 10 years: one as a graduate assistant at USU and nine as a head coach at high schools in Washington, Oregon and Utah.

Stewart, 34, comes to USU after a year as the head coach at the new Alta High School in the Salt Lake Valley.

Prior to his appointment at Alta, he spent three years at Box Elder High in Brigham City where he guided the team to its first region championship in 33 years and a second place finish to Provo in the 1978 state tournament.

He started his high school coaching career with three years (1969-72) at Boistfort (Washington) High and two years at St. Helen's (Oregon) High School before moving to Box Elder.

Following his playing career at USU, he spent the 1968-69 season as a graduate assistant on the Aggie staff.

Aggie fans will remember Stewart as one of the most aggressive Utah basketballers in years; at 6-6 and 225 pounds he was a capable rebounder and he wound up with a career shooting figure of over 59 percent. A Piedmont, Calif., native, he transferred to USU from Santa Rosa JC where he led all the state's junior college scorers during the 1964-65 season with a 26.6 points a game average.

Stewart is married to USU graduate Kathy Birkin, a native of Mackay, Idaho. They are parents of two children: Corey (5) and Amy (3).

Should he stand the test of time—as well as those opposition defenses which will be geared to slow him—returning all-PCAA first-teamer Dean Hunger will likely finish as the best career shooter in Utah State University basketball history. (His current 56% career figure is well ahead of Troy Collier's record 53.2% pace.)

Yet, that is but one of the worlds "Dino" has yet to conquer. For one, he can become one of the very few Aggies to have played on three post-season teams.

USU's all-America candidate, Hunger sometime early in the year will become only the 17th Aggie to ever score 1,000 points during 70 years of the sport in Logan. He needs 89.

AT UTAH STATE: It was obvious early in his career Hunger was destined to join the Aggie greats of the game. In 23 games as a freshman (one as a starter) he averaged over seven points a game and was named the school's freshman athlete of the year. A great career was off and running. All told, he has appeared in 77 games (he's started 42 times) and he has overcome early-season injuries the past two years to put together fine years. His 58.4% shooting performance as a sophomore is the third best season ever at USU. He scored his career high, 28, last year against San Jose State in the



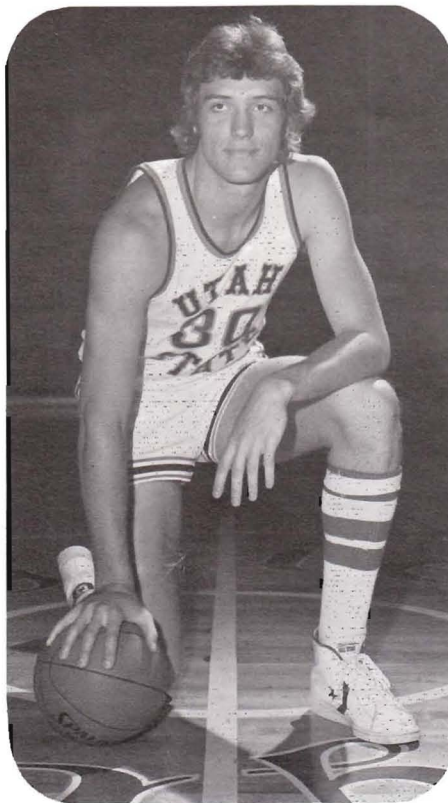

midst of a brilliant five-game set which saw him net 24, 17, 28, 21 and 24, while shooting 63%. All five were important PCAA games (the Ags won four of them) and were critical in USU's drive to second place in the school's first PCAA conference race. USU's "Most Improved Player" following the 1977-78 year, he was "Offensive Player of Year" last season during a campaign which saw him average 17.4 points a game in PCAA games.

HIGH SCHOOL: Played for some outstanding Davis High teams (41-12) under Mike Gardner. The 1974-75 Davis club, Dean's junior year, claimed the state championship. Dean was considered the best big man available to college recruiters following the 1975-76 high school season in Utah.

UP CLOSE: Full name—William Dean Hunger; Birthdate—11/30/58; Birthplace—Provo, Utah; Major—Business Administration, Marketing; Parents—F. Dean and Helen Hunger; Married—to the former Shelli Haslam (August 21, 1979).

TUELLER: "He's the one we're expecting to be our leader, on and off the floor. Dean's an effective inside player but a legitimate forward. He's a true all-America candidate; with another year like last he'll be right up there."

Junior Brian Jackson comprises—with senior Dean Hunger—what Utah State partisans feel is the best pair of forwards in the PCAA today. They are certainly the best shooting forward duo: Hunger (.569) and Jackson (.551). And, among returning PCAA stars, Jackson is the number two scorer (15.8 to Long Beach State's Michael Wiley's 17.1). Add to that Jackson's worth as a rebounder (he led the club as a sophomore at 8.3) and his value to the Aggies becomes self-evident.

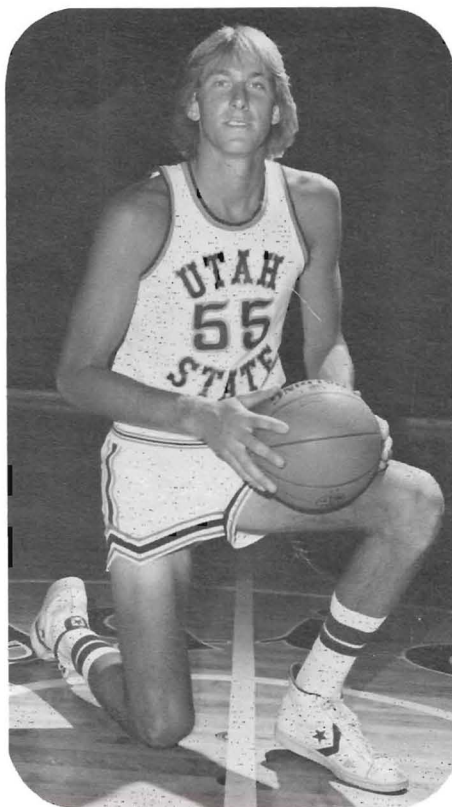

and tore down 13 rebounds that night. Brian started 11 of 28 games as a freshman two years ago, collecting 24 points in USU's memorable double overtime loss that year at BYU.

HIGH SCHOOL: An all-CIF selection as a senior under John Mihaljevich at Palos Verdes, he was considered one of the state's top 12 basketballers as a senior. Mihaljevich considers Jackson and Jan Van Breda Kolff the best forwards to ever come out of Palos Verdes. Averaged 21 points and 15 rebounds a game as a senior on a 19-9 PVH club.

AT UTAH STATE: An all-PCAA second team selection last year, he was USU's second leading scorer (to now graduated Keith McDonald) as well as top rebounder. In all games, he wound up fourth in three different PCAA categories: scoring, shooting and rebounding. A starter in all 30 games a year ago, he was also the team's workhorse: his 1,112 minutes played (37.1 average) was an Aggie high. While his career high (28) came against Western Michigan in the Carrier Classic in Syracuse, N.Y., Jackson was one of the Ags' few bright spots in an 86-67 loss to Southern Cal in the NCAA tournament last March at UCLA's Pauley Pavilion. He scored 17 points

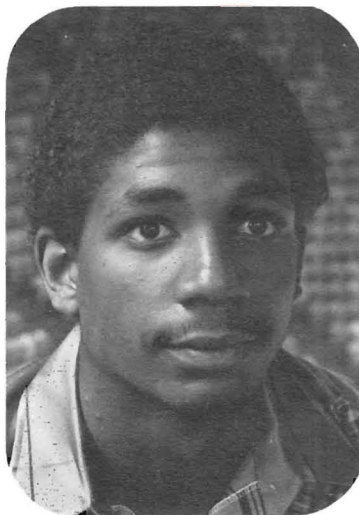

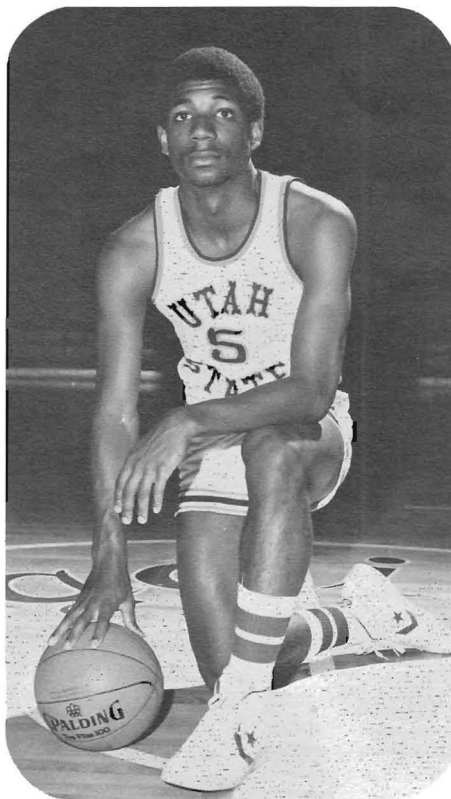

Most remembered for his late-season play which spurred the Aggies into second place in their first year in the PCAA, and past Fresno State during a brilliant comeback in the PCAA post-season tournament, Hood returns for his third year in Logan but it appears his role is changing. His heroics in the past have been fashioned as a reserve, but it appears Keith will be playing this year much more than the 12 minutes a game he averaged last year.

AT UTAH STATE: Mentally tough, yet positive in his approach to the game, Keith played sparingly (15 games) as a freshman at USU averaging just over two points a game. As a sophomore last year he was very effective filling USU's "sixth man" role as both a guard and forward (it is likely, with the addition of JC transfer Edgar Wickliffe at forward, the Ags won't call on Hood as often to play along the baseline.) "Hoodrow's" most dramatic contribution last year may have been his 15 and 13-point games in the PCAA tournament against Fresno State and San Jose State. (15 against San Jose State is a career high.) His season-long statistics showed a 5.1 scoring average.

With returning starters in the backcourt at a premium (there are, in fact, none at USU with the loss of both Rawlee Perkins and Keith McDonald) athletes with any on- the-job training whatsoever are welcome in the Spectrum. Rich McElrath's 477 minutes played last year tops all the returning Aggie guards and that is but one reason he is so prominent in USU's 1979-80 plans. 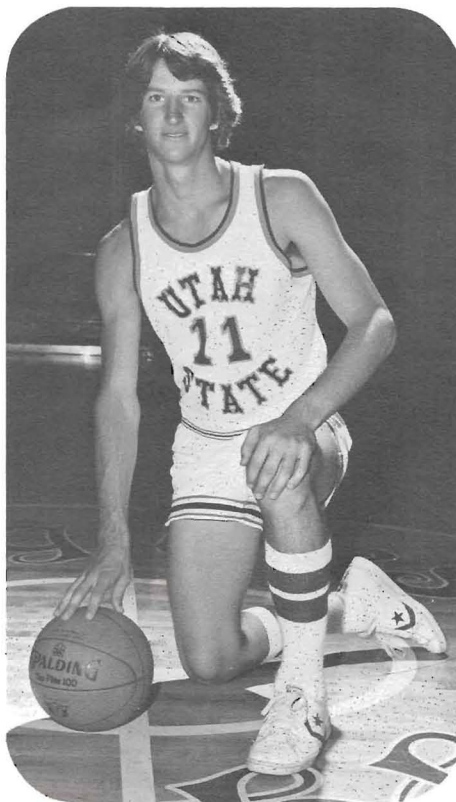
IN JUNIOR COLLEGE: Under Bill Mulligan at Saddleback JC in Mission Viejo, Calif., Rich

AT UTAH STATE: A sophomore starter five times (in 1975-76 against Oregon State, BYU, Colorado State, Idaho State and BYU, again), Craig has primarily filled an off-the-bench role with the Aggies since joining the program prior to the 1974-75 season. Had Utah State basketball been an over-the-counter stock on Wall Street, the news of Leo Cunningham's untimely tendon injury several weeks before pre-season drills began might have created a drain on the market. With Cunningham figuring prominently in USU's plans as the club's only true center, the news must have sent coach Rod Tueller scurrying to the record books for new offensive ideas. But the early word was positive regarding Cunningham's recovery and chances were improving as the season neared that he might be able to contribute in 1979-80.

AT UTAH STATE: As a freshman last year he averaged two points a game and shot 52.4%. Against Fullerton he

It was cause for joy during that Cache Valley spring day when Edgar Wickliffe announced his decision to attend Utah State on a basketball scholarship. Aggie fans saw hope for the future, considering Edgar's athletic history during both his high school and junior college playing days. Even with the loss of a good shooting guard (Keith McDonald) it was felt the Ags wouldn't be in bad shape with a "swing man" of Wickliffe's abilities. During pre-season workouts he eased nicely into Rod Tueller's scheme of things at USU and was making a smooth transition into the major college level of the sport.

USU's Second Year in PCAA

The Pacific Coast Athletic Association is in its 11th year of growth and development.

Through the active and dynamic leadership of the member schools' presidents and athletic directors and under the guidance of aggressive new Commissioner Lew Cryer, the PCAA has proven to be flexible enough to accept the challenges facing college athletics by adapting dramatically innovative concepts.

Even with constant growth and improvement the PCAA, which embraces universities in California and Utah, is not as widely known as it is going to be.

Cal State Fullerton's drive to the 1979 Division I baseball championship and the "Cinderella Story" spun by the same school's basketball team in 1978 have focused attention on the PCAA.

Cryer (now in his second year as PCAA Commissioner) took over for Jess Hill, the league's first fulltime commissioner, in June of 1978. Stability, financial security and national respect were the legacy left by Hill.

Under Cryer the league has been given NCAA sanction for the PCAA-hosted "California Bowl" in Fresno; "Game of the Week" football and basketball TV contracts have been negotiated; the already successful PCAA post-season basketball tournament has flourished and Utah State has become a full-fledge member of the conference.

"The addition of Utah State to the PCAA family is one of the most significant events in the history of the conference," said Cryer. "It transformed the PCAA into a regional conference and brought us into the Salt Lake City and Rocky Mountain markets."

The league is growing, and the schools in the league are doing the same. There is a combined enrollment of 137,128 students at the eight PCAA member institutions.

Currently serving as President of the PCAA is Frank Bowman of Cal State University-Long Beach.



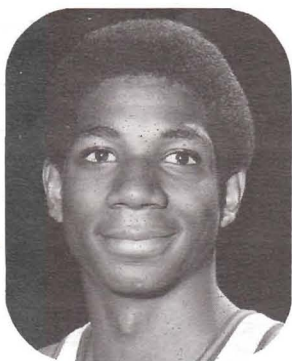

Pete Mathesius Grad Assistant

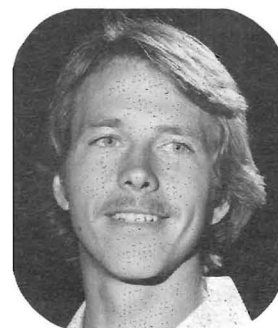
Utah State's junior varsity program during the 1979-80 season will be in the hands of Pete Mathesius (mu-TAY-zee-uhs) for the second year.

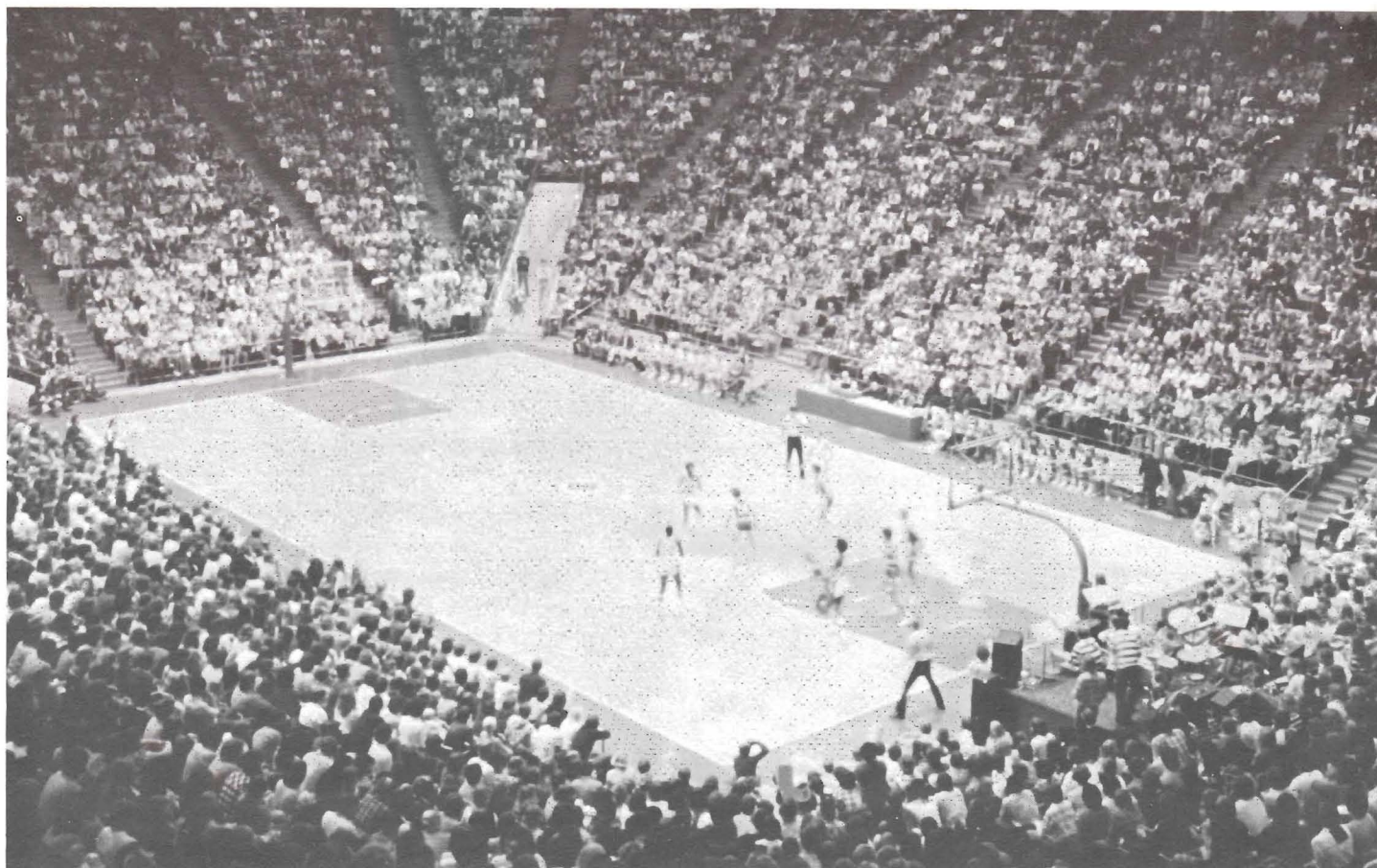

The Spectrum

An average of almost 8,000 fans a game have watched the Aggies in action in nine years since the dedication of the Spectrum, December 1, 1970 (USU defeated Ohio State, 95-89).

Some 1,007,175 fans have filed through the turnstiles in USU's 127 home games during that time.

The Spectrum—one of the nation's most complete college arenas—comfortably seats 10,270 (5,000 student capacity and 3,800 season ticket availabilities). All are chair back seats done in a pleasant color scheme of light orange, dark orange, light gold and yellow. There are 36 rows of seats completely encircling the floor.

Virtually every need common to the staging of a major college game or tournament is provided for including complete dressing room and meeting room facilities for four teams. Aggie teams use the north locker rooms and the visitors use the south facilities. The teams enter the playing floor via nearby ramps.

The playing floor is permanent and is constructed of maple on a cushion, over concrete. The sound system is the most modern available and uses the cluster sound program.

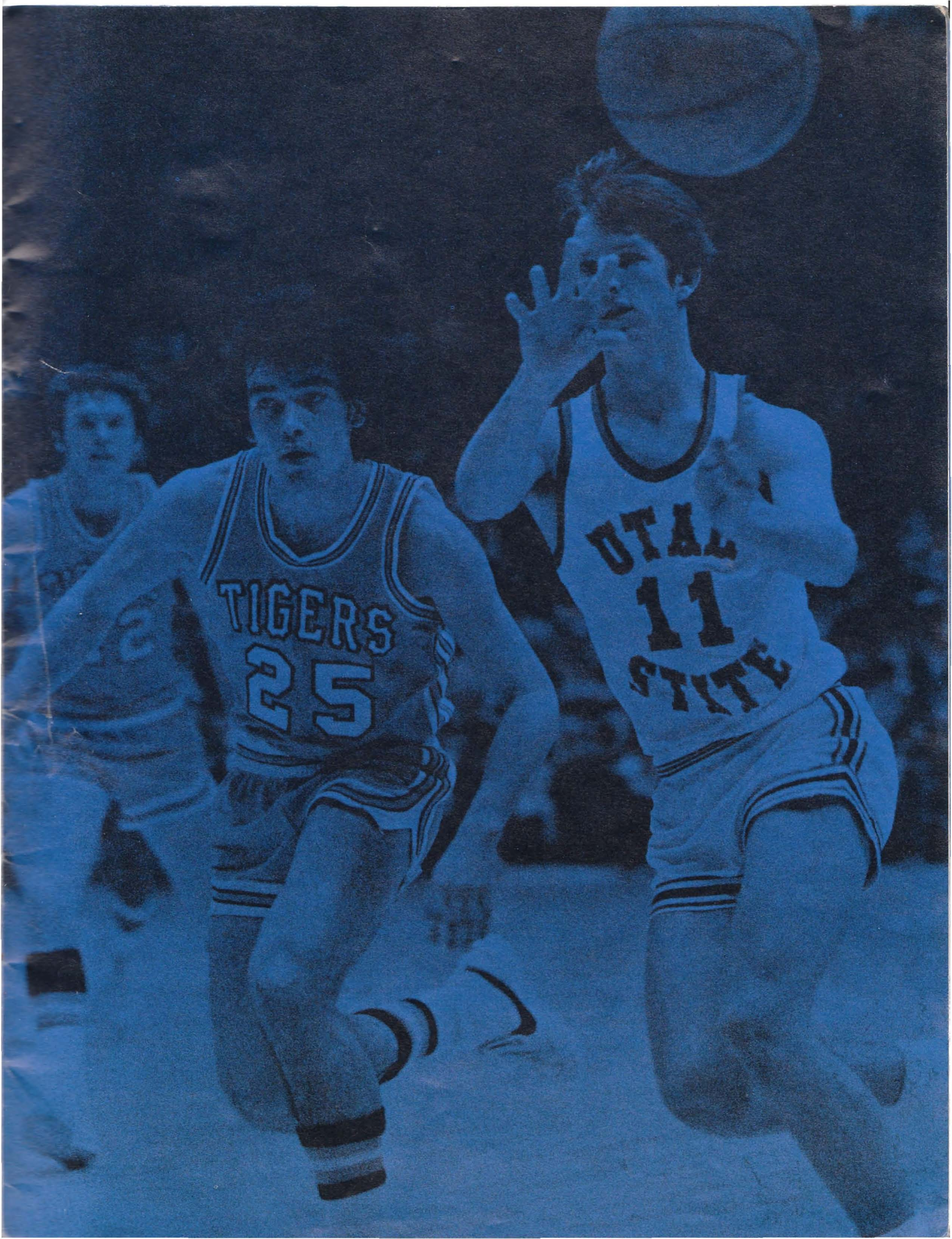

Utah State University

The importance of the individual is emphasized at Utah State University. Additional impetus is being given to individualizing the baccalaureate degree. This is a system by which the individual can pattern his/her program within University policy and progress at his/her speed.

Utah State University has a three-fold purpose: teaching, research, and extension. USU also cooperates with various agencies on a national and international level to help promote understanding and share knowledge.

With a student body of 9,228, Utah State has advantages of both the large and small schools, with such features as a spacious library, excellent laboratories, and top-rated cultural attractions, including world-famous symphonies, ballets, pianists, singers, and lecturers. These advantages are combined with individualized programs characterized by close personal attention.

This University was founded in 1888 as a part of the public educational system of Utah and operates under the constitution and laws of the state. It belongs to a great family of institutions known as land-grant universities, which had their origin in 1862. A rich curriculum is offered in the arts and sciences, in both undergraduate and graduate programs. Degrees granted include the Bachelor's and Master's degrees, Doctor of Education (EdD), and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD).

USU includes eight resident colleges with 47 departments, a School of Graduate Studies, University Extension, and several research programs. There are also current programs in education aid to several foreign countries.

USU is accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, and is on the accepted list of the Association of American Universities, and of the American Council on Education and is listed by other accrediting agencies.

A fifteen-member State Board of Regents governs the Utah State system of higher education. This board has the responsibility for state-wide master planning for higher education, assignment of roles to the several institutions in the state system, and control of operating and capital budgets for the institutions. USU has a nine-member Institutional Council. This council has the responsibility of implementing the assigned roles, including the appointment of personnel and the enactment of rules and governing regulations.

Logan, Utah, home of Utah State University, is a town of 25,000 population located in northern Utah, 80 miles north of Salt Lake City.
