Aggies: Balance and Depth

Through two years in charge, Rod Tueller's Utah State teams **have scored more points than all but two of the nation's major college clubs.**

Some 4,604 points in two seasons isn't bad. That's almost 84 points a game for 55 games.

Offense hasn't been a problem these first two campaigns and, says Tueller, it won't be this year, either.

"I have no qualms at all about our offense," said Tueller, who is after USU's **fourth post-season bid in five years.** "We have the ability again to shoot and score. And more players will be involved in it, too."

The keywords—says Tueller—are **"depth"** and **"balance"** in 1981-82. A bit of a new look. More players shooting better shots. A looming challenge: an out-of-balance schedule which takes the Aggies away from the Spectrum 15 times. (The schedule includes a trip to the Kentucky Invitational where the Ags will be after their third straight holiday title.)

Tueller says his team will get out and go again this winter, under a bit of a rein to insure things don't get out of hand. But it appears in 1981-82 there is a reasonable chance to continue the Aggies' ratio of virtually every other game being of 90 points or better.

Two starters return—6-11½ senior center **Leo Cunningham** and 6-1 junior guard **Lance Washington**—plus Tueller feels he is deeper in talent than he was a year ago.

Reserves who lettered in 1980-81—and should be more prominent this season—are senior guards **Greg Anderson** (6-2) and **Larry Bergeson** (6-0) and 6-7 senior forward **Haakon Austefjord**.

And, there are five "squadmen" in the fold, each with at least one Aggie year behind them: juniors **Frank Shaw** (6-3) and **Scott Harries** (6-5) and sophomores **Joel Rotta** (6-11½), **Bob DeMarco** (6-3) and **Michael McCullough** (6-5).

Creating what Tueller describes as "...an exciting blend of experience and enthusiasm..." are four new athletes: JC transfer **Eric Petersen** (6-7) and freshmen **Greg Grant** (6-7), **Dave Belshe** (6-3½), and **Mark Cutler** (6-8).

Grant, a 21-year old freshman just back from a church mission to Australia, had been impressive during early season drills until a late-October knee injury forced surgery. His status is unknown, but in years ahead he should become an established player.

If Tueller is optimistic about his team's offensive capabilities, he is pleased with the potential defensively and in rebounding (two Aggie drawbacks a year ago.)

"It's our major objective this year to **improve in rebounding and on defense.**" said Tueller. "We averaged over 81 points a game, which is enough to win a lot more games than we did. But, we gave up that many points a game, too. We've got to be able to play it, and play it tougher in crucial spots." (USU was 10 points from a 17-11 record last year.)

With Cunningham's **145 blocked shots** over the past two seasons, it is obvious Utah State's team has a good start at becoming strong on defense with him in the middle. Early-season drills made it evident Petersen will be very good on defense while Austefjord works intensely at whatever he does. Plus, there is enough quickness elsewhere—with McCullough and some of the guards—to indicate the Ags can be strong all-around defensively...if they want to be.

And it appears they will, indeed, be a stronger rebounding team considering Cunningham's 8.7 rebounds a game last year and the physical nature of athletes like Austefjord—the letterman—and Petersen—the newcomer.

The **depth is more experienced;** the 1981-82 Aggie team appears deeper in every spot. That would be even more a factor had Grant not been injured. (USU had a pair of unanimous all-PCAA choices the past two years in Brian Jackson and Dean Hunger; now there is more balance.)

Petersen's 17 points and 11 rebounds a game at Lassen JC (Calif.) last year indicate he could help right away. And the chance to start every game should boost Austefjord's effectiveness markedly his final year in Logan.

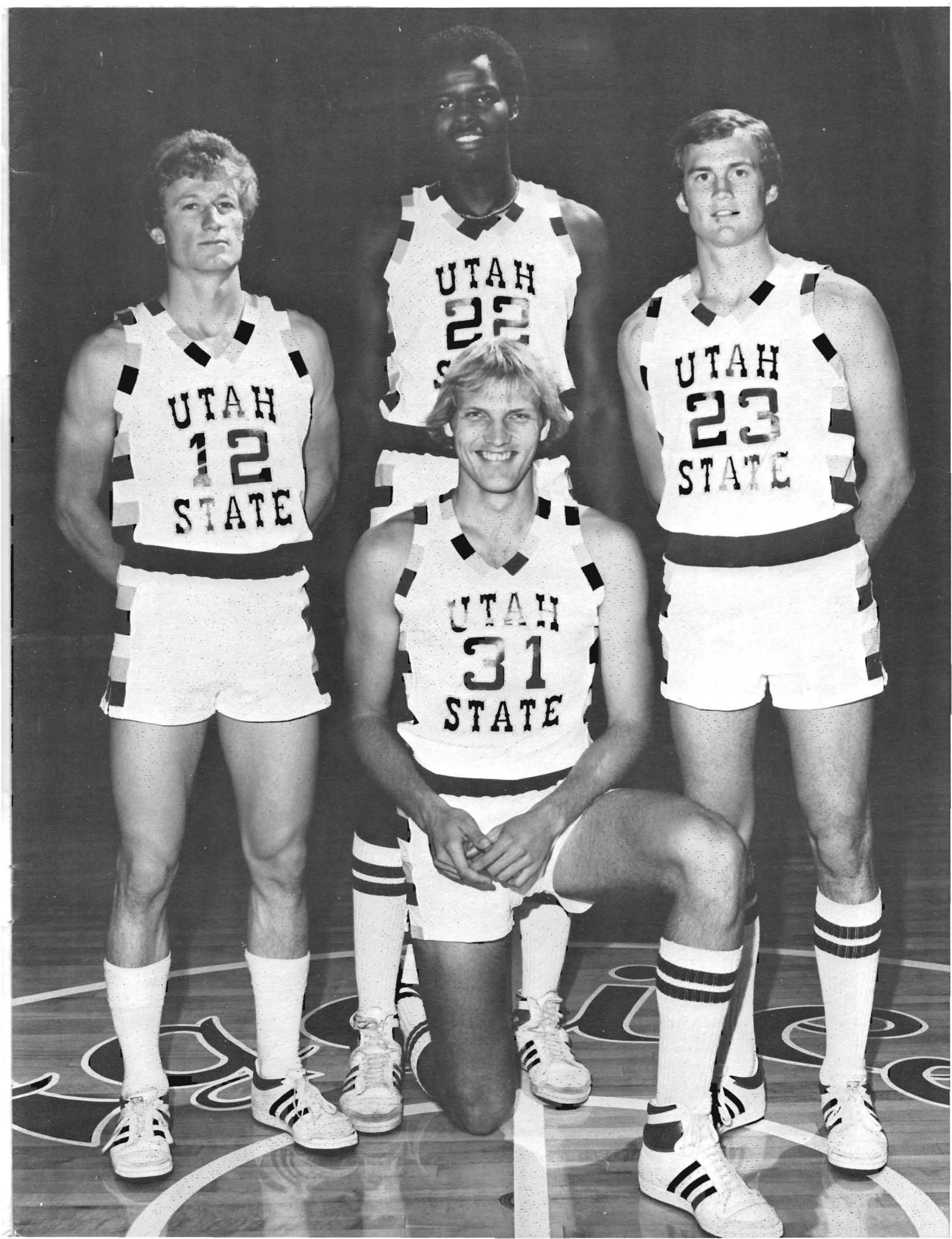
Now a sophomore, McCullough's playing time will increase dramatically (and last year he got into 16 games.) Harries, the Nevada-Reno transfer who played in nine games a year ago, is a good shooter who could help if he shakes nagging injuries. McCullough, Harries and Shaw can "swing", playing either forward or at the big (off) guard.

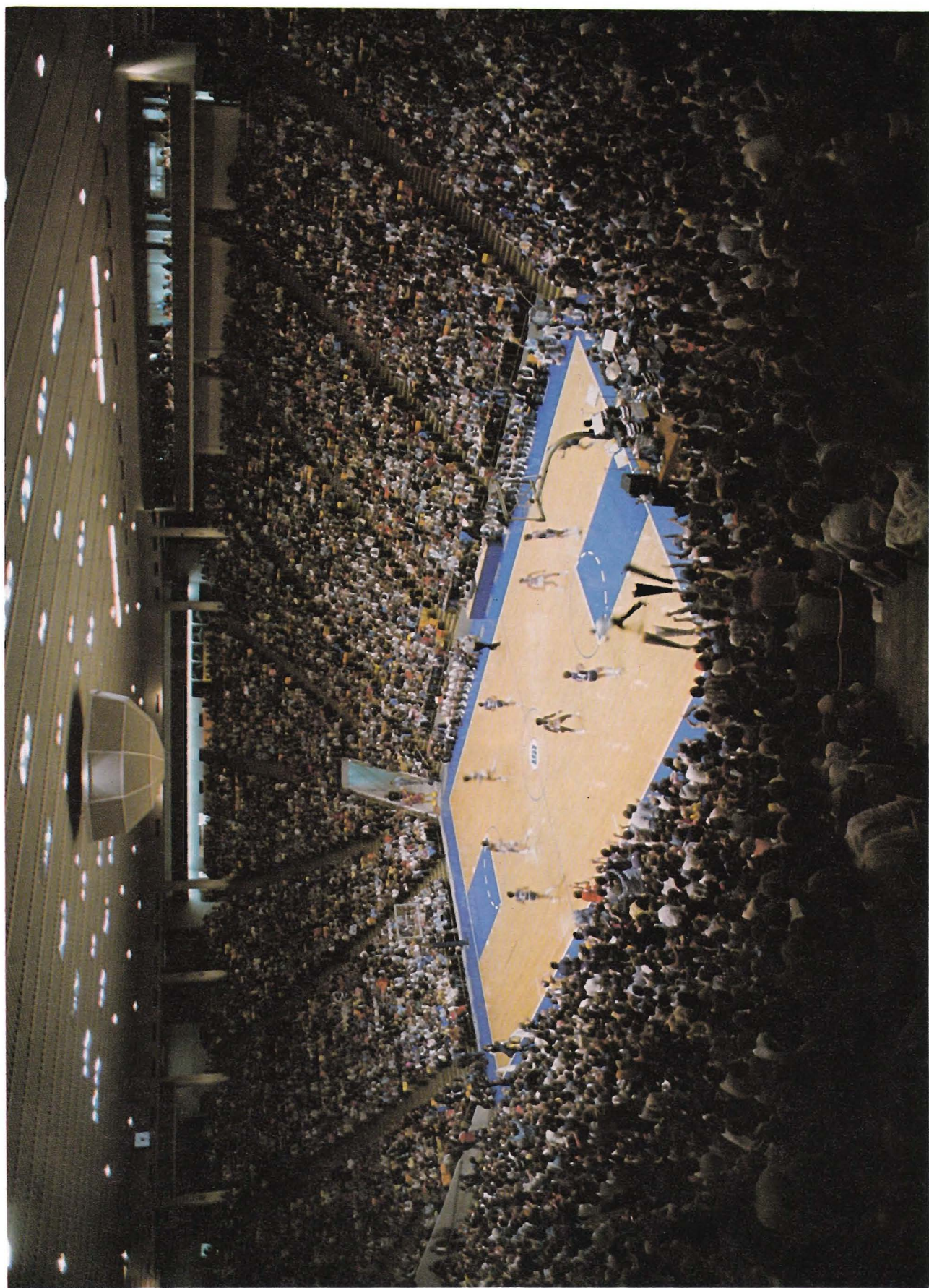
Otherwise, it appears to be a group of athletes with similar skills grouped in the backcourt. Among the "point" guards Washington, the junior, showed some tremendous physical skills at times last year while starting in 23 games; Bergeson, the senior, is a very good outside shooter; and Rotta, the sophomore, is a heady, forceful performer who could make quite a contribution in just his second season.

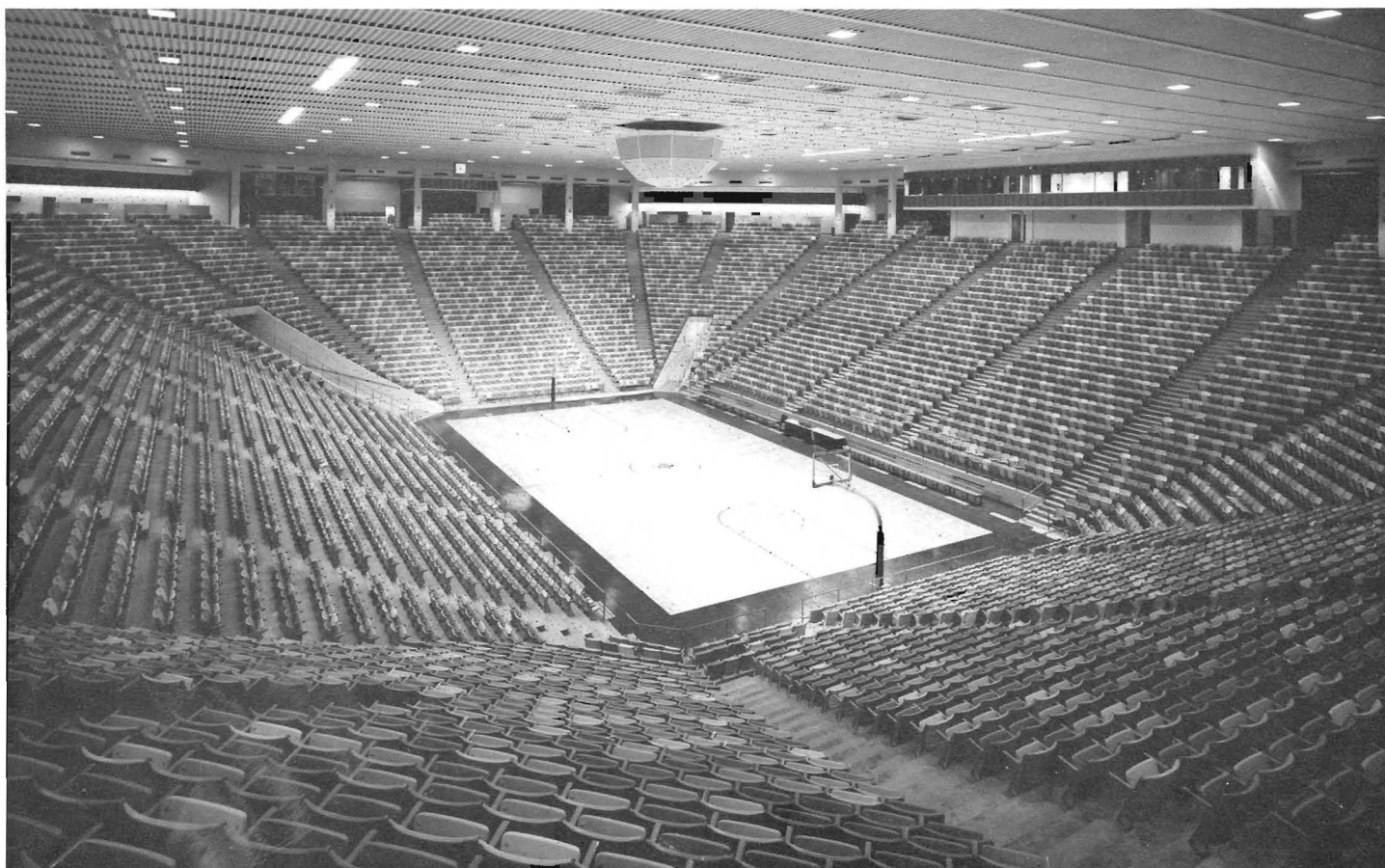
The big guards include Anderson, the senior who transferred from BYU and played in every game in reserve last winter; sophomore Bob DeMarco who was Utah's prep 4A MVP as a senior and shoots very well; and a good big freshman in Dave Belshe from Cypress, Calif. Anderson, with the quickness to stop on a dime and give you change, could be a big factor.

So, after the school's first losing season in nine years, it appears the Aggies will be back on track with a more cohesive, unselfish bunch. The coach says the ball will be passed more freely; more players should play more minutes; strong defense will be played, particularly at important times.

The carrot dangling before the Aggies is their hosting of first round NCAA play in March.







The Spectrum (10,270)

An average of almost 8,000 fans a game have watched the Aggies in action in eleven years since the dedication of the Spectrum, December 1, 1970 (USU defeated Ohio State, 95-89).

Some 1,201,400 fans have filed through the turnstiles in USU's 152 home games during that time.

The Spectrum—one of the nation's most complete college arenas—comfortably seats 10,270 (5,000 student capacity and 3,800 season ticket availabilities). All are chair back seats done in a pleasant color scheme of light orange, dark orange, light gold and yellow. There are 36 rows of seats completely encircling the floor.

Virtually every need common to the staging of a major college game or tournament is provided for including complete dressing room and meeting room facilities for four teams. Aggie teams use the north locker rooms and the visitors the south facilities. The teams enter the playing floor via nearby ramps.

The playing floor is permanent and is constructed of maple on a cushion, over concrete. The sound system is the most modern available and uses the cluster sound program. Scoreboards are installed at each end of the Spectrum.

USU's Hoop Past: Tradition—Rich

Utah State's 1981-82 basketball team is charged with the opportunity to continue one of the country's growing college basketball traditions. The Aggies this season are seeking their **fourth post-season tournament bid over the past five seasons**. Few clubs nationally can enter 1981-82 capable of making such a statement.

Over the past 20 years—since **Ladell Andersen** took over the Aggies and they became consistent winners—USU basketball teams have been averaging a post-season appearance every other year.

USU's beautiful basketball home—the Spectrum—is a result of USU's excellence in the sport.

The names of the athletes who have created this Aggie tradition—and their varied accomplishments—are storied to USU basketball fans.

At the top of the list is **all-American Wayne Estes**, a huge 6-6, 230-pound man mountain who was tragically electrocuted the same evening he scored his 2,001st career point in a game against Denver University in Logan, Feb. 8, 1965.

Wayne scored 48 points that night (he and Rick Barry of Miami had entered that week's play in a tight race for national scoring honors; Wayne was averaging 32.9 points.) He complained of numbness in his hands all during the game, but in the first half he scored 24. The numbness continued but he scored 24 more the second half. "I was just putting the ball up," he said during a post-game radio interview, "but somebody else was putting them in for me."

Within a few hours he was dead. Returning home from a post-game pizza, he and some friends stopped at an accident site on one of Logan's snow-slickened streets. His head brushed a live wire, hanging six and a half feet from the ground, and thousands of watts of electricity shot through his body.

The big, likeable Anaconda, Montana native left an impressive legacy of accomplishment for future Aggies to follow.

Before—and since—the Estes era, great athletes have shared outstanding moments with Aggie fans. **Cornell Green**, third to Estes in career scoring (1,890 points) went on to NFL all-pro greatness with the Dallas Cowboys as a cornerback-safety; **6-8 Marvin Roberts** came all the way from Brooklyn, N.Y. to USU (he scored 1,844 career points) and then on to a professional career in both the ABA and NBA; **6-7 Robert Lauriski**, a Logan native, finished his Aggie career in 1973 and played professionally in Europe; Oakland, California, sensation **Nate Williams** (6-5) spent two years with the Aggies and then played for eight seasons with Kansas City, New Orleans and Golden State in the NBA.

Brain Jackson, a senior last year, finished his four years in Logan with 1,900 points—second on the career chart to Estes. Jackson was the second round draft choice of the NBA's Portland Trailblazers.

Third-year Head Coach **Rod Tueller** (31-24) is continuing to build on the legacy left by his predecessors: Andersen (176-95) and **Dutch Belnap** (106-58).

Tueller's first year (1979-80) resulted in a 19-8 record and USU's first league title in 43 seasons.

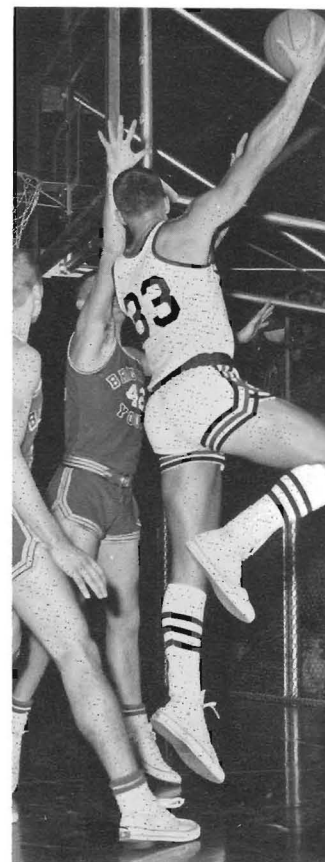
When the Aggies make their appearance in Lexington's Rupp Arena in December of this season, Tueller will be aiming for another Aggie record: a third straight holiday tournament title. Under his guidance, the Aggies have captured the Lobo (Albuquerque) Classic championship as well as the trophy at the InBank (Providence, R.I.) Classic, last year.

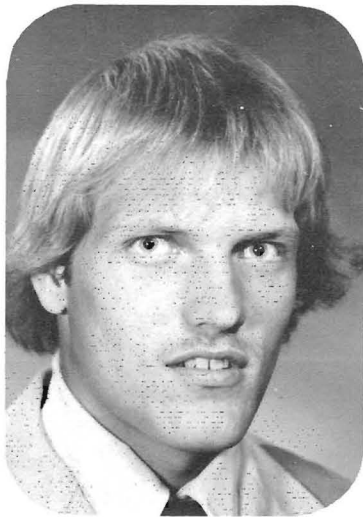
The most experienced of the 1981-82 Aggies, Cunningham has three years of major college basketball behind him (70 games, 55 starting assignments)...has not missed a starting call the past two years...this year's most imposing Aggie figure in the lane, Leo is the tallest, most experienced post man in the PCAA...his strengths: outstanding interior defense and a strong leaping ability to rebound well at both ends of the floor...he must continue to improve and solidify his play as a postman to help the current Aggies...USU's coaches expect to incorporate him more prominently into the Aggie offensive scheme...is known as "Dunkzilla"...his defensive effort on Kevin Magee in the PCAA tournament—with help—was the primary reason the Ags got through the first round of the tournament...Magee was held to half his average: 14 points...Leo's scoring (2.1, 3.9, and 8.8) and rebounding (1.5, 5.6, 8.7) have grown steadily over his career, and that trend must continue to benefit Rod Tueller's '81-'82 team...his blocked shots totals in two years as a starter—58 and 66—have also been impressive...a late-bloomer as a prep, he averaged 15 points and 12 rebounds a game for Reggie Morris at Manual Arts High School in Los Angeles...that club finished the year 21-6 and wound up among the top four of LA's 49 city high schools...USU fans first took notice of Leo as a freshman (1978-79) when he funneled in 10 points and grabbed eight rebounds in 10 minutes of play against Fullerton State...he played well early last year at home against Utah with 17 points and 14 rebounds...later, in game number 22, he scored 17 points and came up with 16 rebounds against Long Beach State in the Spectrum...averagd 14 points and 11 rebounds during a five-game set midway through the PCAA league season...full name: Leo Cunningham, Jr...Physical Education major...son of Elnora and Leo Cunningham...born: September 2, 1960 in Los Angeles.

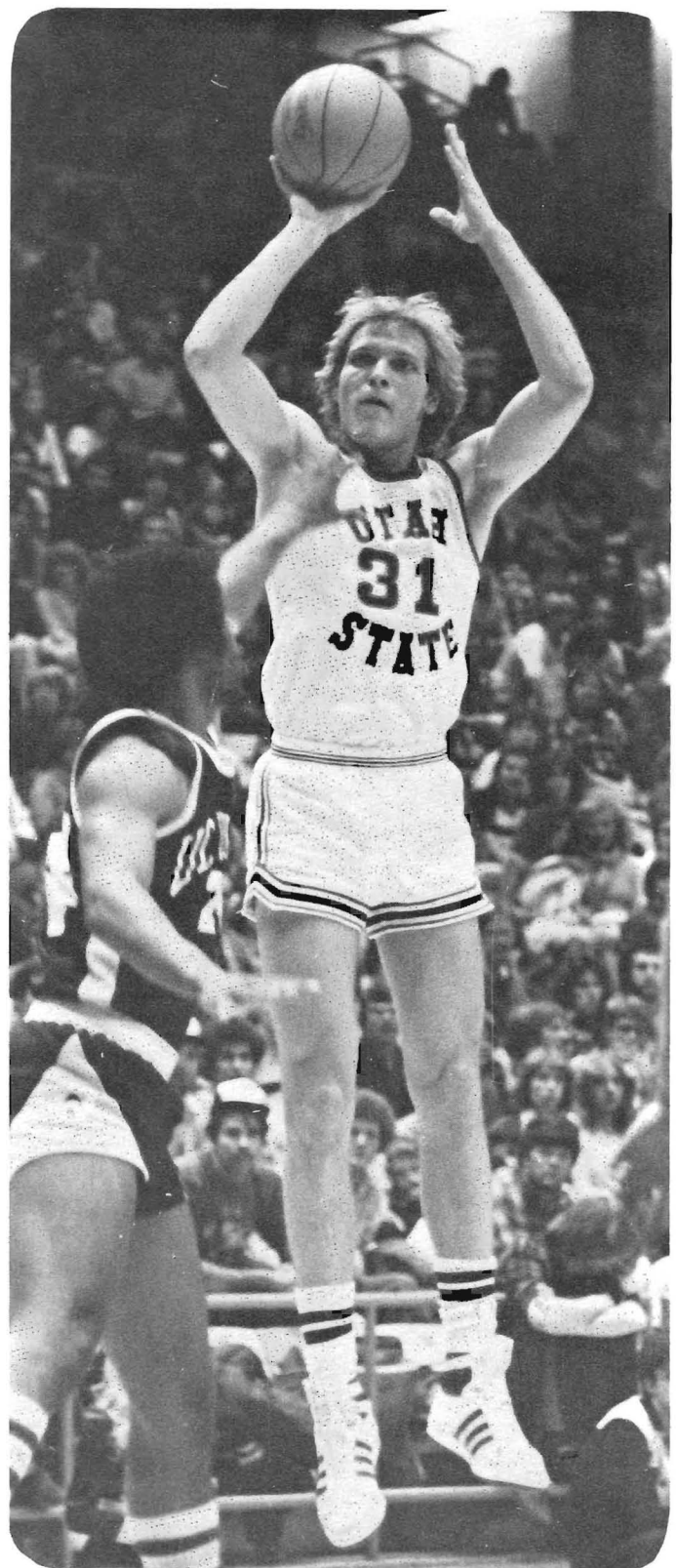

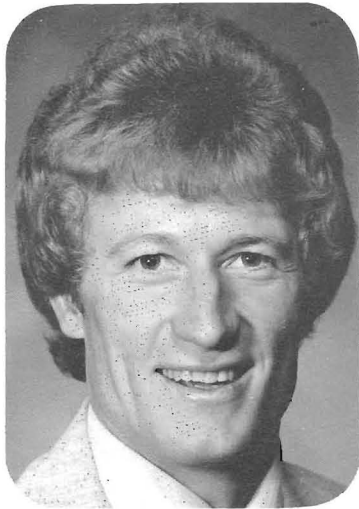
If genius is really perseverance in disguise, then Austefjord wins the prize for "stick-to-itivness"...the most improved of Utah State's performers of a year ago, "Hawk" is back for his fourth year as an Aggie...as a junior, playing in every game and starting three times, he showed excellent growth and improvement at both ends of the floor...his trademark has become tenacity, hard work...possibly there are more talented athletes around, but no one intimidates Haakon...a very strong, physical player...playing nearly 20 minutes a game, he finished fifth on the team with a 7.3 scoring average...scored 14, 12 and 13 points as a starter in three mid-season games last winter against Weber State, East Central and Portland State...a very good markesman, he actually led the Ags in shooting last year (80-of-151, 53.0%)...rarely has a bad night from the floor...made a king-sized contribution to USU's win over UC-Irvine in the PCAA tournament with a career high 17 points and eight rebounds...during that game he did a tremendous job in USU's team-oriented defense on UCI center Kevin Magee...among his better games as a junior would be the December 29 contest at BYU in which he scored 17 points grabbed 14 rebounds and was the Ags' starter during the second half...five nights later in the Spectrum he had 14 points and 12 rebounds against Weber State...obviously a strong possibility to hold down one starting job, Austefjord (AWS-tuh-fjord) nonetheless is a solid, dependable inside player for the Aggies...is very much capable of defending bigger inside power forwards and post players because of his aggressive nature on the floor...once set a junior varsity team record with 36 points and 17 rebounds...he was an all-Central Coast Section honor winner during his days at Monta Vista High under Ray Snyder...that club was 19-8 with Austefjord as a senior...he averaged 17.8 points and 9.8 rebounds that year...Marketing major at USU spent his summer as a security guard...son of Harald and Laila Austefjord...born June 1, 1960 in Tonsberg, Norway.

Rod Tueller: Third Year In Charge

Rod Tueller faces his third year as Utah State's head basketball coach with the same zeal which has earned his clubs records of 31-24 (overall) and 16-11 (PCAA play) his first two seasons.

Tueller, 43, is a 1959 Aggie graduate and the school's 12th basketball coach.

Some six years at USU as Dutch Belnap's assistant groomed Tueller for his current job. And he got his first year (1979-80) on the job put together quite nicely: a 19-8 record (11-2 in the PCAA for USU's first league title in 44 years) and the Aggies' third straight post-season playoff bid. For his work he was named PCAA "Coach of the Year."

The Aggies' 1980-81 record (12-16) was a first for Tueller: in some 22 years of high school and college coaching he had never been connected with a team which lost more than it won.

When he took the USU job in March of 1979, Tueller was the popular choice after a nationwide search for Belnap's successor.

A longtime Cache Valley native, Tueller assumed his new job exactly 20 years after receiving his degree from Utah State. In between were 14 years of high school coaching (at Utah's Altamont and Logan High Schools) and six years on Belnap's staff at USU. During the span he spent with Belnap, the Ags fashioned a fine 106-58 record and appeared three times in post-season play.

His ascension to a head job on the collegiate level resulted from circumstances in stark contrast to a couple of decades earlier when he packed his young family off to eastern Utah and tiny Altamont High...and a situation he knew little about.

Tueller, father of six, knew what he was getting into this time. And he likes the challenge.

"I'm probably as blue and white as anybody you'll find," said Tueller. "I have some great ties with this university. I think I've been involved with this school in about every conceivable way: as a student, as a fan, as a father (his daughters have at-



tended USU and were members of the Aggiettes marching group) and as an employee. These past two years I've been really anxious to maintain the great tradition we have here in basketball."

One of the brilliant young coaches to climb the ranks of Utah's prep game, he spent eight years (1965-1973) as the head coach at Logan High and continually had the Grizzlies in the state tournament. (He spent two years as an assistant coach at Logan, after four years as the head man at Altamont).

Tueller's records on the high school level and during the past at Utah State when he directed the Jayvee program, indicated success (in terms of wins and losses.)

"But to me the real success in athletics is the association you have with players, coaches and administrators. And I attribute my success to being associated with good people.

"I'm not heavily oriented toward long-range goal planning," he said. "Honestly, my long-range goals are greater than any lifetime accomplishments.

"I guess you would say I love to get involved totally in whatever I'm into at the time. I really believe if you take care of the present, the future will be shaped in large measure by how

deeply you dedicate yourself right now."

Tueller, whose teams have both been in the nation's top 10 in scoring, spent several weeks this year lecturing in France and Italy.

Tueller describes his coaching style as "...wide open; fast breaking offense and pressuring defense. But, that doesn't mean I won't do other things to win. The key is adjusting the system to the players, and that will be our over-riding philosophy.

"Certainly, everything we're doing now is with the objective of maintaining USU's great tradition. And while that is the basis of the program now, a prime motivation is to improve it. To win another PCAA title, to become successful in post-season play, and so on."

As a former prep coach, Tueller says one of the joys of collegiate basketball is working with the best of the high school athletes.

"I would call them physical geniuses," he said. "It's a challenge to get them to exercise their potential and to play to their capabilities."

And that is one of the tasks charged to Tueller and assistants Dana Pagett and Tom Stewart.

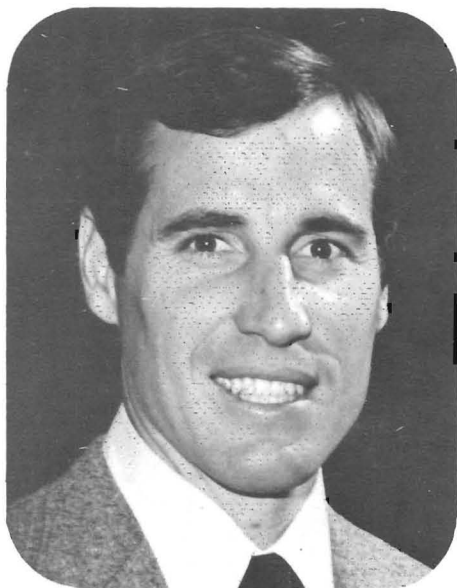
And then there is recruiting, the key to success everywhere in collegiate athletics.

"There is really nothing more to recruiting than selling," he said, "and any salesman will tell you the easiest product to sell is one you believe in. I don't find it too difficult to sell people on Cache Valley and Logan, and Utah State University."

Tueller's exposure to basketball led to a brilliant all-state high school athletic career at Logan High and then he spent a year and a half at the University of Utah playing for the legendary Jack Gardner before transferring to Utah State.

A Cedar City native, Rod is active in his church having served as a Bishop and now a member of his Stake High Council. He is married to the former Valene Danford. They are parents of six children. Two are married: Tina (Comadena) and Dana (Smith). The others are Lisa, Tann, Joni and Juli.

Dana Pagett



There isn't a coach in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association today who is more well-versed on the ins and outs of PCAA basketball than Aggie assistant Dana Pagett.

He received his first coaching exposure to the PCAA in 1974.

Now in his fifth season in Logan—his third as an assistant to Rod Tueller—Dana's years as an aide at longtime PCAA member Long Beach State have been important to USU's recent success.

Once a backcourt performer at the University of Southern California, the 32-year old Pagett is in charge of coordinating Utah State's basketball recruiting effort. In addition, he handles some responsibilities in scouting as well as on-floor coaching.

Dana joined the Aggie staff prior to the 1977-78 season after three years as an assistant coach to Dwight Jones at Long Beach State. Dana's knowledge of the PCAA has been critical in USU's 25-16 league record three seasons in the conference.

While at Long Beach State, Dana helped the 49ers to three conference titles. Long Beach State was 54-27 during that time.

During his four years with the Aggies, Utah State clubs have won 71 games and lost 42.

Dana started his coaching career under the legendary Bob Boyd at USC when he served as a graduate assistant at his alma mater during the 1972-73 season.

Before joining the Long Beach State program, he was an assistant for a year (1973-74) at Loyola of Los Angeles under Dave Benedaret.

A winner at every level of competition, he was a guard on three USC teams (1968-71) which combined to win 47 of 68 games.

Dana is married to the former Sue Birdsall of El Segundo and they have two sons, Brett and Kyle.

Tom Stewart



Onetime Aggie basketballer Tom Stewart, 36, is in his third year as an assistant to Rod Tueller.

Tom, 6-6, was an aggressive baseline performer for Ladell Andersen's USU teams of the late-1960s. After two seasons back in Logan, it is obvious the fervor he brought to the game as a player is being translated into his coaching style.

Once a JC transfer to USU, Tom lettered at USU for three years (1965-68) before spending a season in Logan as an Aggie graduate assistant coach and then nine years as a head coach at high schools in Washington, Oregon and Utah.

Tom came to USU two years ago after a season as the head coach at the new Alta High School in Sandy, Utah.

Prior to his appointment at Alta, he spent three years at Box Elder High in Brigham City where he guided the team to its first region championship in 33 years and a second place finish to Provo in the 1978 state tournament.

He started his high school coaching career with three years (1969-72) at Boistfort (Washington) High and two years at St. Helen's (Oregon) High School before moving to Box Elder.

Following his playing career at USU, he spent the 1968-69 season as a graduate assistant on the Aggie staff with Andersen, Dale Brown and Dutch Belnap.

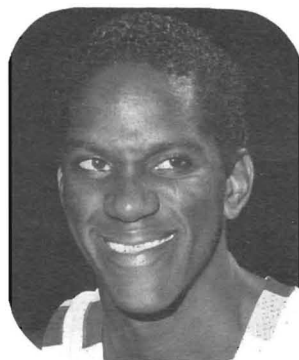

Stewart is married to USU graduate Kathy Birkin, a native of Mackay, Idaho. They are parents of three children: Corey, Amy and Ashley.

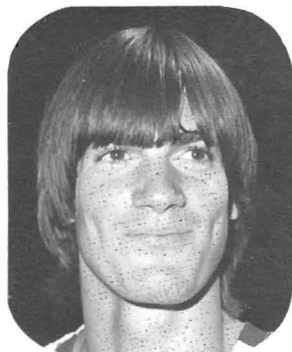

USU's Fourth Year in PCAA

The Pacific Coast Athletic Association is in its 13th year of growth and development.

Through the active and dynamic leadership of the member schools' presidents and athletic directors and under the guidance of aggressive Commissioner Lew Cryer, the PCAA has proven to be flexible enough to accept the challenges facing college athletics by adapting dramatically innovative concepts.

Even with constant growth and improvement the PCAA, which embraces universities in California and Utah, is not as widely known as it is going to be.

Cryer (now in his fourth year as PCAA Commissioner) took over for Jess Hill, the league's first fulltime commissioner, in June of 1978. Stability, financial security and national respect were the legacy left by Hill.

Under Cryer the league has been given NCAA sanction for the PCAA-hosted "California Bowl" in Fresno; "Game of the Week" football and basketball TV contracts have been negotiated; the already successful PCAA post-season basketball tournament has flourished and Utah State has become a full-fledged member of the conference.

"The addition of Utah State to the PCAA family is one of the most significant events in the history of the conference," said Cryer. "It transformed the PCAA into a regional conference and brought us into the Salt Lake City and Rocky Mountain markets."

The league is growing, and the schools in the league are doing the same. There is a combined enrollment of nearly 140,000 students at the eight PCAA member institutions.

Currently serving as President of the PCAA is Dr. Andrew Montana of Cal-State-Fullerton.

Even though the 1981-82 Pacific Coast Athletic Association basketball race is expected to be a real dogfight, it will have to go some to live up to the rich tradition established in the first decade of the conference by some outstanding teams and individuals.

The PCAA was barely two years old when a Jerry Tarkanian-coached California State University, Long Beach team brought it credibility by coming within two points of beating an NCAA championship-bound UCLA team in the Western Regionals.

It was 1971 and the UCLA dynasty was in full bloom.

A year earlier, UCLA handily dumped the 49ers in the semifinals of the Western Regionals, 88-65, and a similar result was expected as the two teams collided in 1971.

However, led by the PCAA's most valuable player, George Trapp, the 49ers had UCLA on the ropes the entire game before finally losing a 57-55 decision.

Cal State Fullerton provided the "Cinderella Story" of the conference's first decade when it came from virtually nowhere in 1978 to within an eyelash of capturing a berth of the NCAA final four.

The Titans of Coach Bobby Dye finished third in the conference that season behind Fresno State and San Diego State, but won a trip to the NCAA playoffs by winning the conference's post-season tourney.

But as in the Cinderella fairytale, Dye's carriage to the NCAA finals turned into a pumpkin when his scrappy squad fell to the eventual national runners-up Arkansas Razorbacks, 61-58, in the regional finals.

Even in that defeat, though, the Titan's play against all odds that year won forever the admiration of their conference peers.

The following season the Utah State Aggies joined the PCAA, bringing with them a rich heritage of basketball excellence. Since 1960, Utah State's basketball troops have recorded 17 winning seasons in 20 outings. In two of the three losing seasons, the Aggies were a mere two games under .500.

So clearly, Utah State's acceptance into the conference in 1978 continued to further the basketball reputation of the PCAA.

The Aggies wasted little time proving they would be a force in the conference as they finished their first campaign second behind Pacific and thus earned another journey to the NCAA playoffs.

In 1979-80 the Aggies made it to the top of the PCAA heap with an 11-2 conference mark and for the third consecutive year went to the NAAs.

Utah State University

The importance of the individual is emphasized at Utah State University. Additional impetus is being given to individualizing the baccalaureate degree. This is a system by which the individual can pattern his/her program within University policy and progress at his/her speed.

Utah State University has a three-fold purpose: teaching, research, and extension. USU also cooperates with various agencies on a national and international level to help promote understanding and share knowledge.

With a student body of 10,200, Utah State has advantages of both the large and small schools, with such features as a spacious library, excellent laboratories, and top-rated cultural attractions, including world-famous symphonies, ballets, pianists, singers, and lecturers. These advantages are combined with individualized programs characterized by close personal attention.

This University was founded in 1888 as a part of the public educational system of Utah and operates under the constitution and laws of the state. It belongs to a great family of institutions known as land-grant universities, which had their

origin in 1862. A rich curriculum is offered in the arts and sciences, in both undergraduate and graduate programs. Degrees granted include the Bachelor's and Master's degrees, Doctor of Education (EdD), and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD).

USU includes eight resident colleges with 44 departments, a School of Graduate Studies, University Extension, and several research programs. There are also current programs in education aid to several foreign countries.

USU is accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, and is on the accepted list of the Association of American Universities, and of the American Council on Education and is listed by other accrediting agencies.

A sixteen-member State Board of Regents governs the Utah State system of higher education. This board has the responsibility for state-wide master planning for higher education, assignment of roles to the several institutions in the state system, and control of operating and capital budgets for the institutions. USU has a nine-member Institutional Council. This council has the responsibility of implementing the assigned roles, including the appointment of personnel and the enactment of rules and governing regulations.

Logan, Utah, home of Utah State University, is a town of 25,000 population located in northern Utah, 85 miles north of Salt Lake City.
