# More USU Surprises in Store for 83-84?

## Ags Coming Off 20-9 Turnaround with Four Starters Back

After last year's transformation, what possibly could Rod Tueller have in mind to top 1982-83? (The Aggies were America's most improved team, changing from a 4-23 pumpkin into a 20-9 NCAA entrant last March.)

An improvement of 15 games in one short year is remarkable. (In fact, somebody suggested if USU could get better again, this time by just 11 games, they would be national champs.)

Well, Tueller would like to take this all one phase at a time. But he does admit to being "...cautiously optimistic..." about what 1983-84 has in store.

He has reason.

Four veterans are back and one—6-7—Greg Grant—is an all-America candidate (though just a sophomore). In addition, there are 6-7 Ron Ence, 6-5 Michael McCullough and 6-5 Chris

McMullin. All were starters. That's experience! Why else might this be a solid team?

**1) Depth:** "...it looks better than I've ever seen at Utah State..." says Tueller.

**2) Shooting:** the Ags have a bunch of good shooters who take smart shots (50.3% last year).

**3) Quickness:** almost to a man, the 14 players will tell you quickness is one of the strengths.

**4) Defense:** always something to work on, for sure, but Aggie opponents shot over 50% just four times in 29 games last winter (and only 43.3% the entire year).

**5) Rebounding:** you had to ask. The Ags know they aren't the biggest team around, but have made plans to make the best of it.

Grant is a special talent, but hardly the whole show. He led the team, as a freshman, in scoring and rebounding and shooting. USU's "MVP", he was the PCAA "Freshman of the Year" and he was also selected to the all-District Seven team and second team all-conference in one of the country's respected basketball conferences.

What excites Aggie fans is the veteran element: the four starters back plus four other lettermen and a redshirt. Add to that two talented junior college transfers—6-2 Vince Washington and 6-6 Jeff Anderson—and you sense the depth Tueller is proud of.

Of the four non-starting lettermen who return—6-8 Gary Beck, 6-10 Ron Hansen, 6-3 Jerome Wiley and 6-1 Joel Rotta—Rotta may have the best chance to fill the fifth starting position. He understudied Lance Washington last year at point guard and now faces the challenge of the other Washington (transfer Vince) for the starting assignment.

The head coach's son—5-9 Tann—was redshirted last year after a year at Ricks Junior College and two more years on a church mission.

The balance of the team is comprised of three good-looking freshmen: 6-5 Reid Newey, 6-1 Darrin Long and 6-8 Danny Conway.

While this Aggie team **may** be better, the schedule **will** be tougher: appearances in both the Indiana and Cougar (BYU) Classics, the tough six-game in-state grind (against Weber State, Utah and BYU) and a difficult 18-game PCAA schedule (this year including new addition New Mexico State).

Tueller knows sneaking up on opponents is a thing of the past.

"Since there will be no surprise element, we'll use that to our advantage," he said. "We've got to be ready. We have a good nucleus with the nine players who have been in the program, and the new athletes give us a nice blend.

"We think this will be an exceptional shooting team, with very good balance and good speed and quickness. And another strength of this team is their compatibility."

## The Way It Was: The Turnaround Year

### A Review of the USU's 20-9 Season of 1982-83

There they were, Utah State's basketball Aggies, fresh from the woebegone **4-23** season of 1981-82 (the school's worst year ever), and armed with a pre-season ranking as the PCAA's **eighth best team** in a nine-team league.

No matter.

Rod Tueller, in his fourth season, went about the task of assembling a competitive unit with the same optimism which somehow shone through during the season of 23 defeats.

And what a season it would be as the Aggies sprinted to 10 wins in the season's first 11 games—the **fastest start in almost eight decades of Aggie basketball**—on the way to becoming the **country's "most improved team"** for 1982-83.

Tueller fashioned his magic using 1) an injured freshman/redshirt forward from the year before (**Greg Grant**); 2) a pair of Dixie JC transfers (guard **Chris McMullin** and forward **Ron Ence**); 3) a holdover starting guard (**Lance Washington**) and a holdover starting forward (**Michael McCullough**); 4) important help from veterans in reserve (**Eric Petersen** and **Scott Harries**); 5) a renewed emphasis on the defensive phase of the game, and 6) some **positive scheduling**.

Let the record show the Aggies played 12 of their first 15 games in the Spectrum—coming out with a 13-2 record—before leaving on the first league road trip in late January. That means the Ags were 13-2 before the first conference road swing, and 7-7 afterward.

Along the way the Aggies earned their 4th post-season bid in 6 years, and

cornered the prestigious Quirrh Bucket, symbolic of the **state's collegiate basketball championship**, by capturing wins in five of six games against BYU, Utah, and Weber State. A 21-point win over Utah was the biggest in 20 years.

USU also won the school's **third holiday basketball tournament** in Rod Tueller's four years: this time the resurrected Big Blue Classic with an impressive 84-59 win over a very good Texas Christian team.


The BBC title sent Tueller and his bunch into the PCAA season with a rush: a 10-1 record, a seven-game winning streak (second longest in Tueller's tenure), and facing a four-game home stand to begin the league season, starting with nationally ranked UNLV.

The fifth-largest crowd in Spectrum history (**10,506**) saw the Aggies jump to an early 23-9 lead against the Rebels, lose the lead in the second half, and then fight back before being tied and losing it in overtime, 89-77.

It was an exciting beginning to an eventful fifth season for USU in the PCAA, finally winding up with a **10-6** league record—good for third place—and a **20-9** overall mark (USU's first 20-wins season in five years).

It was a year which included the 64-59 loss in the NAAs to Iowa and important home wins against Fresno State and Fullerton State, a precedent-setting victory at San Jose State, and disappointing losses by four, two, and four points at Fresno State, UC-Irvine and Fullerton State.


After the brilliant start the Aggies never lost twice in a row, but went into a win-lose-win-lose alternating pattern the final month of the PCAA season.





# GREG GRANT

Forward 6-7 201 So. Salt Lake City (East)




**5** Greg Grant wants nothing to do with the talk that the credit is his, the credit for turning a 4-23 team (without him) to a 20-9 team (last year, with him)...of course, Grant was one of three new players (with Chris McMullin and Ron Ence) who cracked the starting lineup last winter— joining two veterans—as the Aggies battled their way to last year's national "Turnaround team of the year" award...credit or not, this talented, 6-7 sophomore is **USU's candidate for all-America honors**... "I don't know if you can measure the maturity he added and the improvement he made his first year on this level of competition," said Rod Tueller. "And now he's bigger, he has improved his physical capabilities and he has improved his shooting range. Think of what he gives us: scoring, rebounding, he's very good at getting a rebound and outlet pass off to a guard and then getting down the court."...Grant was the Ags' top scorer (14.7), rebounder (9.1) and shooter (56.1%) last year...**BASKETBALL WEEKLY** named him to its' third team Freshman All-American squad...he was the PCAA "Freshman of the Year," he earned all-PCAA second team honors and he was named AP honorable mention all-America...chosen the MVP in USU's December Big Blue Classic (38 points, 24 rebounds in two games)...was December's "Athlete of the Month" in Utah, chosen by the Deseret News...Grant is a very good left-handed outside shooter who also plays up around the rim with his extraordinarily long arms (he has a wingspan of seven feet!)...his surprising step of quickness consistently catches opponents off guard on dribble drives to the basket...a reaction/instinct player...with three seasons of collegiate competition remaining, Grant has already won the "Cec" Baker Award as USU's MVP for the 1982-83 season...was chosen by the U.S. Basketball Writers to the all-district 7 team...his 462 points and 263 rebounds last year shattered Brian Jackson's Aggie freshman records...while he did pace USU's scoring, Grant, very much a team-oriented player, only averaged 10 shot attempts a game...averaged close to 16 points a game in 16 PCAA games as a freshman, and just once failed to score in double figures...in all games, Grant was USU's leading rebounder 21 times and leading scorer 12 times...Grant originally arrived at USU prior to the 1981-82 season and was showing encouraging signs when felled by a knee injury, and subsequent surgery forced him out for the entire year...he had joined the USU program following a two-year church mission in Australia...averaged 20.3 points and 15 rebounds a game as a high school senior at East High, the state's second best team during the 1978-79 season...earned all-state honors for Head Coach Dick Milne at East...Grant's best game ever: "I think it was the Fullerton State game here last year. It's the only game in my career I every played without getting any fouls. I shot over 60%, had 10 rebounds, and, most importantly, we won a big game."...career highs: 23 points against both San Jose State and UC-Santa Barbara and 15 rebounds against Idaho State...the most important benefit of USU's summer tour to Brazil: "For me it was the rough style of play; learning how to play more physical. As a team, it taught us again to play together through some adversity"...the strengths of this current Aggie team: "Quickness, ability to move the ball well, balance, shooting ability...and defense. I think this team will play strong defense." the strengths of your game: "I feel I can rebound with anybody. I'm confident I can score any time I have the ball within 15 feet of the basket"...son of Bonnie and Judge Paul Grant, a two-year player at the University of Utah...an Accounting major at USU...born 3-25-60 in Salt Lake City.



# RON ENCE

Forward 6-7 180 Sr. Salt Lake City (Olympus)

**23** When the 1982-83 season began—and Aggie fans were watching with interest to see where USU basketball was headed after a 4-23 season—Ron Ence was watching, too, from the bench...he was the "sixth" man...in 10 pre-season games, coming off the bench, Ence was an immediate hit...he was averaging around 13 points a game (playing 25 minutes a game), he was the Ags' leading scorer to that point in the season and the Aggies were 9-1...then, in the final pre-season game (the championship game of the Big Blue Classic against TCU), Ence became a starter after veteran Eric Petersen went down the night before with a knee injury...he started every game from that point on (including all 16 PCAA games) and became the Aggies' number two scorer (12.9) and rebounder (6.3) behind Greg Grant...he also became recipient of an award from BASKETBALL WEEKLY: he was recognized as a member of BW's first team national all-JC transfer team...Ence, along with 6-5 guard Chris McMullin, transferred to USU last year from Neil Roberts' Dixie (Utah) College program and they became important elements in the turnaround season, from 4-23 to 20-9..."Ron has got to be one of the most underrated athletes in the college game today," said Rod Tueller. "He is a very effective player at both ends of the floor. He gives up some size at times, but his intelligence and refined skills at the position make up for it. Ron is the sort of person who will do whatever it takes to make his team better."...Ence has never played for a losing team either in high school, junior college or in one year on the major college level...was USU's best free throw shooter last year (77.4%) and he was second to Grant in field goal shooting (54.3%)...Ron scored a collegiate career high in the PCAA opener in January at home against UNLV with 23 points, playing 44 of the 45 minutes in USU's overtime loss to the nationally-ranked Rebels...Ence's most memorable game: "It was the first round of the state tournament as a senior; it was my best game ever, statistically. I scored 25 points, had 19 rebounds and 10 assists. And we won..."...what did you get out of the summer tour of Brazil: "A couple of bruised ribs. It was physical. But I did learn how to use my body to my advantage..."...in what ways has your game improved since last year: "Hopefully in rebounding and shooting. With more intelligence in my rebounding, better timing, I hope I'll be improved that way..."...the strength of Ron Ence's game: "I would like to think it would just be an ability to contribute to the team, somehow. I have to contribute in each area. That was one big reason we did so well last year: so many guys gave so much. A couple of times on the Brazil trip we would have done a better job if I had made a larger contribution..."...how good can this USU team be: "I thought last year's team was a quick team; this year's is quicker. But, we're a little smaller. There are so many characteristics that carry over from a year ago. So, if we just play a little bit smarter in the final five minutes of each game, we'll be better than last year..."...Ence made two appearances in the national JC tournament with Dixie College, being named to the 1979 national all-tournament team before leaving on a two-year church mission and returning to Dixie for the 1981-82 season...Dixie was third and sixth in the country his two years...he was important in a pair of second place finishes in state tournament play at Olympus High for Coach Ron Steinke...majoring in Organizational Communications at USU...full name: Ronald Paul Ence...son of Mary and C. Carlton Ence...born 1-13-60 in Salt Lake City.




# MICHAEL McCULLOUGH

Guard/Forward 6-5 172 Sr. Rancho Cordova, CA (Cordova)

Meet the Aggies' old hand—the only fourth-year senior on the current team... "Pokey," as they call him (a reference to his slow eating style), started in all 29 of Utah State's games last fall and 16 of 26 his sophomore year... he is recognized as one of the PCAA's premier defensive players, although he has also chipped in with scoring averages of 10.5 and 11.3 the past two years... "Michael is the most experienced player in our program," said Rod Tueller. "He is an outstanding defensive player who has really taken pride in that phase of the game; we've asked him to take on some tough assignments, sometimes against much bigger people. The ability he has shown to contribute at both ends of the floor makes him a valuable part of this team."... a fine physical specimen who has always shown excellent speed and quickness, McCullough reported back this fall in the best condition in his career... has been named USU's "Outstanding Defensive Player" for two years running... a fluid athlete who is considered a good "transition" player (he gets up and down the court with the best of them)... the past two years Michael has fashioned some interesting mid-season scoring bursts: last year in games 14 through 18 he averaged 17 points a game (including a career high 22 points at Fresno State)... as a sophomore he also had a brilliant 22-point game before nearly 23,000 fans in Provo as the Aggies upset BYU... has appeared in 71 games in three years at USU, starting 48 times... his most memorable game: "My senior year in high school in the first league game of the year we played Kennedy High—we were ranked 1-2 in our area—and it all started out very badly for me. I got two fouls the first minute of play but our coach kept me in and I scored 44 points that night and had 16 rebounds. Everything I threw up went in. Our leading scorer that year was in foul trouble the entire night so everybody looked to me."... your most important accomplishment in basketball: "I would say my interaction with the people I've met here who haven't been exposed to someone from my part of the country or someone of my race. And through basketball these people have been a little more open to me than they might in another situation. It's been a positive experience, for me and them."... the most important benefit of the Aggies' summer tour of Brazil: "It had to be culturally. I had never been out of the country before. I saw how others are living and I woke up to how fortunate we are in this country."... how good can this USU team be: "This team could turn out to be very, very good. I don't want to overstate it, but there is a lot of potential here. We're expecting a lot from each other. We're looking for one of the best teams to ever represent USU."... the strength of this Aggie team: "I think it would be in the team concept. There are no egos on this team, no jealousies. Each of us knows he'll get his shots, he'll get his playing time."... prior to arriving at USU, Michael was the team captain for Hub Morpheus's Cordova High teams which had records of 20-7, 28-3, and 27-5 with Michael in the lineup... McCullough was named the Sacramento County "Player of the Year" and Metro league MVP... had senior year averages of 19.7 points and 12.2 rebounds... full name Michael Anthony McCullough... Political Science major... son of David and Martha McCullough... born 9-9-62 in Omaha, Nebraska.




### Michael McCullough





With opposition defenses as cognizant as they will be of USU's two top returning scorers along the baseline (forward Greg Grant and Ron Ence), one of USU's year-long "gameplans" becomes obvious: this smooth-shooting senior will be putting it up more often...new to USU last winter, from Utah's Dixie JC, Chris was a major contributor during the Ags' 20-9, NCAA tournament season...and both coaches and Chris himself agree he didn't play to his potential...voted USU's "Most Inspirational Player" he was a starter in all 29 games at guard and he played more minutes (1,008) than any other Aggie... "His steady influence and overall play was a major factor to our success last year," said Rod Tueller. "With the way teams will attack us this winter, it may dictate Chris shoot more than a year ago. And, of course, we're all confident with that."...A 51% shooter during the Ags' 10-1 pre-season, McMullin wound up hitting 47.5% of his shots...twice scored career highs of 18 points: against UC-Santa Barbara and UC-Irvine...was USU's leading scorer three times last year: at Irvine, at Las Vegas and in the home finale against Long Beach State...was USU's Mr. Timex: he took a lickin' and kept on tickin' with several scrapes and scratches...his 10.9 scoring average was fourth best among the Aggies...a very good free throw shooter (he once hit 29-of-29 in a national JC tournament game), Chris last winter hit 90-of-117 free throws (76.9%)...hit the memorable shot at the buzzer at Utah last December which beat the Utes...McMullin's best game ever: "It was in the national junior college tournament against Mercer of New Jersey. That's the game I hit the 29 free throws, but I also rebounded pretty well and it was a good game offensively for me."...his most important accomplishment in the game: "I would say proving I can play on this level, after there wasn't much interest in me out of high school."...the most important benefit of the Aggies' summer tour of Brazil: "I learned to appreciate America a lot more. It hits you hard to see people in a country like that having a difficult time just surviving. And, we learned that basketball is played in America the way it should be played."...the strength of the current Aggie team: "I would say our quickness and shooting: I really think we're all good shooters. We're not afraid to have anybody shoot it. We could be bigger, but we work very hard on defense."...how has your game improved: "I have a lot more confidence in my shooting. A year ago I was the new man and I didn't shoot it a lot. But, I'm a lot more comfortable with my shot now."...averaged 13 points a game as a freshman at Dixie JC and 18.5 as a sophomore for Neil Roberts' teams with 17-11 and 30-6 records...He was named all-tournament in each of the seven tournaments Dixie entered during 1981-82...earlier, named all-state playing for Joel Gardner (current BYU assistant) at Orem High which finished second in the state with a 17-8 record in 1979-80...Business major at USU...son of Douglas and Barbara McMullin...one of six children and one brother, Jeff, is his twin...another brother, Bill, was a four-year golf letterman for the Aggies...born 10-23-61 in Salt Lake City.




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**21 Jeff Anderson Forward 6-6 185 Jr. Salt Lake City (Skyline)**




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**44 Gary Beck Forward/Center 6-8 220 Jr. Alpine (American Fork)**




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**30 Danny Conway Forward 6-8 190 Fr. Rexburg, ID (Madison)**




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**22 Ron Hansen Center 6-10 240 So. Corning, CA (Corning)**






## 32 Reid Newey Guard 6-5 180 Fr. Roy (Roy)


## 11 Joel Rotta Guard 6-1 165 Jr. Salt Lake City (Judge Memorial)


## 25 Tann Tueller Guard 5-9 155 So. Logan (Logan)


## 12 Jerome Wiley Guard 6-3 186 So. Redondo Beach, CA (Mira Costa)

# 82-83 Ags Bring Back Oquirrh Bucket

For the third time ever—and after an absence of six years—the state's collegiate basketball title trophy rests once more in the Spectrum.

Rod Tueller and his Aggie team put together an impressive 5-1 record last winter in-state (against teams from Weber State, Utah and BYU) and that won the coveted Old Oquirrh (oh-kerr) Bucket.

The bucket is symbolic of basketball supremacy in the basketball-crazy state of Utah. It goes each year to the team which has not only the best overall record, but the team which has won the most games against other in-state rivals.

The bucket is named after the Oquirrh Mountains, located on the west side of the Salt Lake Valley.

Legend has it that around the turn of the century, when prospecting for copper and other ores in the area started, a FARMER stumbled onto a cave. In the cave he found the skeleton of an old UTE INDIAN who used the cave to store his possessions. Along side the INDIAN skeleton were the remains of a COUGAR and a WILDCAT. Apparently the two felines happened to wander into the cave while the INDIAN

was counting up his cache of goods, which included an old copper bucket fashioned out of the ore in the hills. A fight ensued, ending in the deaths of all three.

The FARMER picked up the bucket and took it back home where it remained within his family's possession until recently, when it was purchased by some local businessmen to be used as the symbolic trophy. (If you buy this tale, check with Utah SID Bruce Woodbury: he has a tapioca farm for sale in Louisiana.)

The idea for a trophy was first proposed in 1974, and for the first two years it was awarded to the Aggies, but no actual trophy was given.

In 1977, after Weber State had won it for the first time, some local Ogden businessmen decided it was time to locate a bucket. Findley Gridley, an Ogden attorney, came upon the bucket at a local auction, complete with a history of how it had been found. Gridley, along with two of his partners, Bob Phillips and Bob Echard, bought the bucket, put it on a wooden stand and presented it to Neil McCarthy. It has been traveling ever since.

# Rod Tueller

Head Coach

After the past two years, there can't be too many more of the emotions of college basketball for Rod Tueller to experience.

In a sense, he's seen it all. From a 4-23 season to the remarkable coaching job of last year as he constructed a 20-9 record and earned USU its second NCAA bid in his four years.

**Amazingly, through the good times and the bad, his demeanor has remained constant; always the same, win or lose.** And now begins Year Five of the Tueller Era at USU. And with it, Tueller's second decade with USU. (In Rod's 10 years associated with the program, the Ags have made five post-season trips.)

Rod, 45, is a 1959 Utah State graduate and he is the school's 12th head basketball coach.

Six years as an assistant at USU to Dutch Belnap groomed him for his current job. When he became the Aggie head coach in March of 1979, he was the popular choice following a nationwide search for Belnap's successor.

**Tueller proved himself worthy of that confidence quickly.**

What followed was a 19-8 record (during the 1979-80 season), a PCAA record and the Ags' first league title in 44 years, and designation as the PCAA "Coach of the Year." All of it earned the Aggies what, then, was their third straight post-season bid.

The record shows Tueller's teams with marks of 19-8, 12-16, 4-23 and 20-9...a pre-1983-84 career mark of 55-56.

A longtime Cache Valley native, Tueller assumed his current job exactly 20 years after receiving his degree from Utah State. In between were 14 years of high school coaching (at Utah's Altamont and Logan High Schools) and six years on Belnap's staff at USU. During the span he spent with Belnap, the Ags fashioned a fine 106-58 record and appeared three times in post-season play.

His ascension to a head job on the collegiate level resulted from circumstances in stark contrast to a couple of decades earlier when he packed his young family off to eastern Utah and

tiny Altamont High...and a situation he knew little about.

**Tueller, father of six, knew what he was getting into this time. And he likes the challenge.**

"I'm probably as blue and white as anybody you'll find," said Tueller. "I have some great ties with this university. I think I've been involved with this school in about every conceivable way: as a student, as a fan, as a father (his daughters and son have attended USU) and as an employee. These past ten years I've been really anxious to maintain the great tradition we have here in basketball."

One of the brilliant young coaches to climb the ranks of Utah's prep game, he spent eight years (1965-1973) as the head coach at Logan High and continually had the Grizzlies in the state tournament once finishing second. (He spent two years as an assistant coach at Logan, after four years as the head man at Altamont).

Tueller describes his coaching style as "...wide open; fast breaking offense and pressuring defense. But, that doesn't mean I won't do other things to win. The key is adjusting the system to the players, and that continues to be our over-riding philosophy.

**"Certainly, everything we're doing is with the objective of maintaining USU's great tradition. And while that is the basis of the program now, a prime motivation is to improve it. To win another PCAA title, to become successful in post-season play, and so on."**

As a former prep coach, Tueller says one of the joys of collegiate basketball is working with the best of the high school athletes.

"I would call them physical geniuses," he said. "It's a

challenge to get them to exercise their potential and to play to their capabilities."

And then there is recruiting, the key to success everywhere in collegiate athletics.

"There is really nothing more to recruiting than selling," he said, "and any salesman will tell you the easiest product to sell is one you believe in. I don't find it too difficult to sell people on Cache Valley and Logan, and Utah State University."

**Tueller's records through the years indicate success (in terms of wins and losses.)**

"But to me the real success in athletics is the association you have with players, coaches and administrators. And I attribute my success to being associated with good people.


"I'm not heavily oriented toward long-range goal planning," he said. "Honestly, my long-range goals are greater than any lifetime accomplishments.

"I guess you would say I love to get involved totally in whatever I'm into at the time. I really believe if you take care of the present, the future will be shaped in large measure by how deeply you dedicate yourself right now."

Tueller's early exposure to basketball led to a brilliant all-state high school athletic career at Logan High and then he spent a year and a half at the University of Utah playing for the legendary Jack Gardner before transferring to Utah State.

A Cedar City native, Rod is active in his church having served as a Bishop and a member of his Stake High Council. He is married to the former Valene Danford. They are parents of six children. Four are married: Tina (Comadena), Dana (Smith), Lisa (Harries) and Joni (Nelson). The others are Aggie player Tann and Juli.

Rod and Valene are grandparents of three.



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# Tom Stewart

Assistant Coach

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This is the fifth year as an assistant coach at Utah State for Tom Stewart.

Himself an ex-Aggie player, Stewart, 38, took on additional duties as recruiting coordinator prior to the 1982-83 season.

Tom returned to Utah State to join the staff four years ago after a season as the head coach at Alta High School in Sandy, Utah.

At 6-6, Stewart was an aggressive baseline performer for Ladell Andersen's USU teams of the late- 1960s. It has become obvious to Aggie fans Tom's style as a player has been translated into his coaching style.

Utah State fans will remember Stewart as one of the most physical Utah basketballers in years; at 6-6 and 225 pounds he was a capable rebounder and he finished his career with a three-year shooting figure of 59%.

A native of Piedmont, California, he transferred to USU from Santa Rosa JC where he led all the state's junior college scorers during the 1964-65 season with an average of 26.6 points a game.

Following his playing career at USU (1965-68), he spent the 1968-69 season as a graduate assistant on the Aggie staff with Andersen, Dale Brown and Dutch Belnap.

He started his high school coaching career with three years (1969-72) at Boistfort (Washington) High and two years at St. Helen's (Oregon) High School.

He later took over the program at Utah's Box Elder High School. In three years in Brigham City he guided the Bees to the school's first region championship in 33 years and to a second place finish behind Provo in the 1978 state championships.

"I've always preferred playing and coaching a fastbreak style," said Stewart, "although the style of my high school teams ran the gamut of the game. But that was dictated by physical limitations; your philosophy must bend according to the talent on hand.

"I think there must always be one important constant in the game in order to succeed, and that is teamwork. That is true both offensively and defensively.

"But I'm like our Aggie fans: I like good, smart, fastbreak-early offense basketball."

Tom, a member of the NABC's District Seven Public Relations and Promotions Committee, spends time during daily practice sessions working with the Aggie big men. During the summer he coached a team of USU alums on a tour of Puerto Rico.

Stewart is married to the former Kathy Birkin, a native of Mackay, Idaho, and they are parents of three children: Corey (10), Amy (8) and Ashley (2).

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# Mike Riley

Assistant Coach

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Considering he had planned to have a doctorate in Russian History by now, 39-year old Mike Riley has done quite nicely in his first professional love: basketball coaching.

This season marks Riley's 16th year in the college game. He joined Rod Tueller's staff prior to last season after 12 years as a head coach.

A native of Richmond, Indiana, (and a 1966 graduate of Nebraska's Chadron State), Riley in 1968 had completed a Master's Degree in European History and had begun preparations at Ball State University towards a doctorate in Russian History.

That's when Del Harris—who would later become the Head Coach of the NBA's Houston Rockets—asked him to join his coaching staff at Earlham College in Richmond.

The rest of it, as they say, is history.

After two years with Harris at Earlham, Riley became the head coach at Western Wyoming JC (Rock Springs) from 1970-72.

He then took over (for six seasons) at South Dakota Tech in Rapid City before spending four years directing the program at Western State College (1979-82) prior to joining the Aggies.

In each of his head coaching stops, Riley has earned the reputation as a builder.

In Rapid City, he guided Tech to a pair of conference titles and two appearances in the NAIA district playoffs.

He took over Western State's program at its' lowest ebb: the Mountaineers had won 11 games in three years prior to his arrival.

His final year at Western State, he put together a 16-8 season, the best record at the school in 46 years.

Mike is a believer in multiple defenses "...teams these days are too talented to defend with one style for 40 minutes..." and his coaching background meshes nicely with the longstanding tradition of Aggie up-tempo basketball.

"The philosophy of our system here is set by Coach Tueller," said Riley, "and we're here to help with suggested adjustments within that framework. One of the reasons for our success last year was the flexibility with which Rod has built this team; on this level your opponents won't always let you do what you do best."

Last summer Riley was involved in his fourth year as a head coach in the Puerto Rico Basketball Federation, a league of 16 teams. He was in charge of the Quebradillas Pirates and coached them into the playoffs.

Riley is in charge of the team's academic advisement program.

Mike and his wife, the former Dolores Glasford, are parents of Nichole (17) and Michael (9). His twin brother, Larry, is the head coach at Eastern New Mexico in Portales.

# Dave Kragthorpe

## Athletic Director

Dave Kragthorpe, 50, became Utah State's Director of Athletics in June, succeeding Ladell Andersen who resigned to become the BYU basketball coach.

His naming marked the completion of an athletic odyssey which began the summer of 1951 when Kragthorpe arrived on the Logan campus as a promising lineman recruit from his native Mound, Minnesota.

Kragthorpe's most recent stop had been the head football coaching position at Idaho State, where it took him two years to transform the Bengals from an 0-11 club into a 12-1 Division I-AA national championship team.

"I'm very happy to be back," he said during a press conference in early June to announce his appointment, "and especially in this position. I've been gearing toward a future in administration and the Utah State opening seemed logical to me.

"I guess you could say I've made the complete cycle. I came here 32 years ago as an athlete. I really have no other aspirations than to continue to build on the greatness of USU athletics.

The new USU Director has wasted no time structuring his gameplan.

"Finances, That's the number one priority at any school," he said. "And the possibility to raise more money and maintain competitive programs exists for every school. There are new and different ways to enhance that and I'll be working on them.

"I am in favor of a strong overall program and that means maintaining all sports. We want to become the strongest, most balanced program in the PCAA."

Kragthorpe brought administrative experience with him from Idaho State, where he has doubled as Assistant Athletic Director in addition to his football duties.

It was his emphasis on a crowd-pleasing passing game—and the success it created—which accounted for 57 records and the doubling of attendance figures at the Minidome. He was named to Big Sky Conference and NCAA District VII Coach of the Year honors during his ISU tenure.

He joined the Bengals after 10 seasons as assistant head coach and offensive line coach at BYU, where he coached 17 all-WAC linemen...some still active in the pros. His years in Provo seemed to form the basis of the success he enjoyed at BYU.

Dave Kragthorpe was born May 1, 1933, in Mound, Minnesota, and became a three-sport standout and all-stater at Mound High School before following his prep coach, Cal Stoll, to Logan when Stoll became an assistant to John Roning in 1951.

Kragthorpe became an all-Skyline two-way line performer during the 1953 and 1954 collegiate seasons prior to graduating from USU in 1955. (He earned his M.Ed. from USU in 1963.)


He spent a year with the New York Giants (1955) and played football and baseball for the Naval Training Center in San Diego before taking over the Aggie baseball program and serving as frosh football coach in 1957.

Kragthorpe moved to Idaho Falls High as an assistant coach (1958-59) and then became head coach at Roosevelt High in Wyandotte, Michigan. His teams there were 22-12-2 from 1960-63.

He rejoined the collegiate coaching ranks as an assistant at Montana (1964-66) and South Dakota State (1967-68) and then became the head football coach at South Dakota State in 1969.

That was followed by a major college coaching opportunity at Brigham Young University in 1970.

Kragthorpe is married to the former Barbara Ann Barnson of Kearns, Utah. They have two sons: Kurt, a sportswriter at the DESERET NEWS in Salt Lake City; and Steve, a freshman quarterback at Eastern New Mexico University.



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# USU's Hoop Past: Tradition-Rich

Utah State's 1983-84 basketball team is charged with the opportunity to continue one of the country's growing college basketball traditions. The Aggies this season are seeking their **fifth post-season tournament bid over the past seven seasons**. Few clubs nationally can enter 1983-84 capable of making such a statement.

Over the past 20 years—since **Ladell Andersen** took over the Aggies and they became consistent winners—USU basketball teams have been averaging a post-season appearance every other year.

USU's beautiful basketball home—the Spectrum—is a result of USU's excellence in the sport.

The names of the athletes who have created this Aggie tradition—and their varied accomplishments—are storied to USU basketball fans.

At the top of the list is **all-American Wayne Estes**, a huge 6-6, 230-pound man mountain who was tragically electrocuted the same evening he scored his 2,001st career point in a game against Denver University in Logan, Feb. 8, 1965.

Wayne scored 48 points that night (he and Rick Barry of Miami had entered that week's play in a tight race for national scoring honors; Wayne was averaging 32.9 points.) He complained of numbness in his hands all during the game, but in the first half he scored 24. The numbness continued but he scored 24 more the second half. "I was just putting the ball up," he said during a post-game radio interview, "but somebody else was putting them in for me."

Within a few hours he was dead. Returning home from a post-game pizza, he and some friends stopped at an accident site on one of Logan's snow-slickened streets. His head brushed a live wire, hanging six and a half feet from the ground, and thousands of watts of electricity shot through his body.

The big, likeable Anaconda, Montana native left an impressive legacy of accomplishment for future Aggies to follow.

Before—and since—the Estes era, great athletes have shared outstanding moments with Aggie fans. **Cornell Green**, third to Estes in career scoring (1,980 points) went on to NFL all-pro greatness with the Dallas Cowboys as a cornerback-safety; **6-8 Marvin Roberts** came all the way from Brooklyn, N.Y. to USU (he scored 1,844 career points) and then on to a professional career in both the ABA and NBA; **6-7 Robert Lauriski**, a Logan native, finished his Aggie career in 1973 and played professionally in Europe; Oakland, California, sensation **Nate Williams** (6-5) spent two years with the Aggies and then played for eight seasons with Kansas City, New Orleans and Golden State in the NBA.

Brian Jackson, a senior in 1980-81, finished his four years in Logan with 1,900 points—second on the career chart to Estes. Jackson was the second round draft choice of the NBA's Portland Trailblazers.

Fifth-year Head Coach **Rod Tueller** is continuing to build on the legacy left by his predecessors: **Andersen** (176-95) and **Dutch Belnap** (106-58).

Tueller's first year (1979-80) resulted in a 19-8 record and USU's first league title in 44 seasons.

Under his guidance, the Aggies have captured the Lobo (Albuquerque) Classic championship as well as the trophy at the InBank (Providence, R.I.) Classic last year, another NCAA trip and the Big Blue Classic last December.



# The Spectrum (10,270)

An average of almost 8,000 fans a game have watched the Aggies in action in 13 years since the dedication of the Spectrum, December 1, 1970 (USU defeated Ohio State, 95-89).

Some 1,393,001 fans have filed through the turnstiles in USU's 182 home games during that time.

The Spectrum—one of the nation's most complete college arenas—comfortably seats 10,270 (5,000 student capacity and 3,800 season ticket availabilities). All are chair back seats done in a pleasant color scheme of light orange, dark orange, light gold and yellow. There are 36 rows of seats completely encircling the floor.

Virtually every need common to the staging of a major college game or tournament is provided for including complete dressing room and meeting room facilities for four teams. Aggie teams use the north locker rooms and the visitors the south facilities. The teams enter the playing floor via nearby ramps.

The playing floor is permanent and is constructed of maple on a cushion, over concrete. The sound system is the most modern available and uses the cluster sound program. Scoreboards are installed at each end of the Spectrum.



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# Utah State University

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The importance of the individual is emphasized at Utah State University. Additional impetus is being given to individualizing the baccalaureate degree. This is a system by which the individual can pattern his/her program within University policy and progress at his/her speed.

Utah State University has a three-fold purpose: teaching, research, and extension. USU also cooperates with various agencies on a national and international level to help promote understanding and share knowledge.

With a student body of 11,849, Utah State has advantages of both the large and small schools, with such features as a spacious library, excellent laboratories, and top-rated cultural attractions, including world-famous symphonies, ballets, pianists, singers, and lecturers. These advantages are combined with individualized programs characterized by close personal attention.

This University was founded in 1888 as a part of the public educational system of Utah and operates under the constitution and laws of the state. It belongs to a great family of institutions known as land-grant universities, which had their origin in 1862. A rich curriculum is

offered in the arts and sciences, in both undergraduate and graduate programs. Degrees granted include the Bachelor's and Master's degrees, Doctor of Education (EdD), and Doctor of Philosophy (PhD).

USU includes eight resident colleges with 44 departments, a School of Graduate Studies, University Extension, and several research programs. There are also current programs in education aid to several foreign countries.

USU is accredited by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools, and is on the accepted list of the Association of American Universities, and of the American Council on Education and is listed by other accrediting agencies.

A sixteen-member State Board of Regents governs the Utah State system of higher education. This board has the responsibility for state-wide master planning for higher education, assignment of roles to the several institutions in the state system, and control of operating and capital budgets for the institutions. USU has a nine-member Institutional Council. This council has the responsibility of implementing the assigned roles, including the appointment of personnel and the enactment of rules and governing regulations.

Logan, Utah, home of Utah State University, is a town of 25,000 population located in northern Utah, 85 miles north of Salt Lake City.

# USU's Sixth Year in PCAA

This 1983-84 season marks Utah State's sixth year of membership in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

Classified as NCAA Division 1 in all sports, the PCAA has flourished under the active and dynamic leadership of former Commissioner Jesse T. Hill and his successor Lewis A. Cryer, who is in his sixth year at the League's helm.

Known as one of the most innovative Conferences in the country, the PCAA Post-Season Basketball Tournament became the first of its kind on the West Coast when it was initiated in 1975 as a means of determining the conference's representative to the NCAA playoffs. The tournament has continued to grow in stature and this past season was played before record crowds at the Forum in Los Angeles last March.

A desire to form a Division 1 conference is the spark that led to the formation of the PCAA on July 1, 1969.

Five of the seven charter members of the PCAA still are part of the league. They are CSU Long Beach, Fresno State, San Jose State, University of the Pacific, and UC Santa Barbara.

Cal State Fullerton joined the conference in the summer of 1974, followed by UC Irvine in July, 1977. Utah State University's addition to the league in October, 1977, transformed the PCAA into a regional conference. Nevada-Las Vegas competed for the first time last winter as a PCAA basketball-playing member and New Mexico State is new this season.

Allen Agnew of Fresno State currently serves as the PCAA President, USU Faculty Athletic Representative, Norm Jones, was elected to serve as the League's Vice President.

The Pacific Coast Athletic Association is in its 15th year of growth and development.

Even with constant growth and improvement the PCAA, which embraces universities in California, Nevada, New Mexico and Utah, is not as widely known as it is going to be.

Cryer (now in his sixth year as PCAA Commissioner) took over for Hill, the league's first fulltime commissioner, in June of 1978. Stability, financial security and national respect were the legacy left by Hill.

Under Cryer the league has been given NCAA sanction for the PCAA-hosted "California Bowl" in Fresno; "Game of the Week" football and basketball TV contracts have been negotiated; the already successful PCAA post-season basketball tournament has flourished and New Mexico State, Utah State and UNLV have become full-fledged members of the conference.

"The addition of Utah State to the PCAA family was one of the most significant events in the history of the conference," said Cryer. "It transformed the PCAA into a regional conference and brought us into the Salt Lake City and Rocky Mountain markets."

The league is growing, and the schools in the league are doing the same. There is a combined enrollment of nearly 160,000 students at the nine PCAA member institutions.

Even though the 1983-84 Pacific Coast Athletic Association basketball race is expected to be a real dogfight, it will have to go some to live up to the rich tradition established in the conference by some outstanding teams and individuals.
